

WILL PLAY MT. ANGEL TOMORROW

WILLAMETTE TEAM HAS A GAME ARRANGED WITH THE "WHITE WINGS" WHICH PROMISES TO SHOW SOME CLASS.

Last night Dr. Sweetland succeeded in arranging a football game with Mt. Angel college to be played here tomorrow.

Mt. Angel has the heaviest team in its history, weighing somewhere between 160 and 170 pounds which will more than equal the weight of the Willamette men.

Curtis Coleman, the former U. of O. end, and second baseman for the Tacoma Tigers, is coaching them and will probably play in the Mt. Angel team.

The game will be a hard one and not at all one-sided as Coach Sweetland will line up his weakest substitutes against them and Mt. Angel will have as good a show of winning as Willamette.

The regular team is pretty well knocked out at this time. McRae's broken finger is still bad, Rader's knee still bothers him, Blackwell has a lame back and McKnight has a sore leg. That leaves the team awfully weak, as the lack of substitutes is keenly felt and those that can be put in are not first class.

The line-up will probably be as follows: Gibson, a sub-end, will go in as fullback; Roland, a boy of 16 years, will play right half on account of the sprained ankle of McMaechen, and Cummins will play left half; Paul Homan will probably play quarter most of the game, while Knutson will play center; Bellinger and Homan will fill guard positions; Westley and McKnight, tackles; Lowe and McRae, ends. The line is pretty strong and will probably do all the playing.

MRS. GEER NOT KILLED WITH HER HUSBAND

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 28.—Mrs. Vashti Geer, the young wife of Earl Geer, who was murdered by Manos tribes in the Philippine uprisings, did not share her husband's fate. Mrs. Ida Large, of this city, has received a cablegram from her daughter, Mrs. Geer, saying that she escaped to Zamboanga, 100 miles away from the scene of the massacre, and is safe. The body of Geer has not been recovered from the tribesmen. The cablegram gives no details of her escape. Only the timely arrival of troops, it is believed, saved Mrs. Geer from the fate of her husband.

AND PRICES ARE STILL GOING UP

CHICAGO PACKERS SAY TOO MUCH PROSPERITY, WHILE AT THEIR DOORS WOMAN ATTEMPTS SUICIDE ON ACCOUNT OF HIGH COST OF LIVING.

Chicago, Oct. 27.—The high cost of living as justification for an attempt at suicide was upheld by the Chicago municipal court today when it released Mrs. Katherine Elson, wife of Jacob Elson, a cabman, and the mother of eight children, who was charged with attempted self destruction.

Elson pleading for his wife's dismissal said he earned \$13 weekly.

"The children wanted feathers on their hats like other children," said Elson, "and \$13 a week wouldn't buy food. I sank deeper and deeper into debt. I knew my wife contemplated suicide but couldn't blame her and never said a word when I saw her bring home a bottle of poison."

Mrs. Elson drank poison but was saved by prompt medical assistance.

PORTLAND WILL HAVE BIG GAME

ALL STARS TO PLAY BEAVERS NOVEMBER 13 — FIELDER JONES, FORMER LEADER OF CHICAGO WHITE SOX TO LEAD ALL STARS.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 27.—It was announced today that Fielder Jones, the former famous leader of the Chicago White Sox, would lead the All-Star aggregation against the Beavers. The game will be played on Sunday, November 13, provided the weather is favorable. The proceeds of the contest is to be divided among the Portland team.

"Speck" Harkness, one of the star twirlers of the Beavers last season, will don the uniform and pitch for the All-Stars and Billy Sullivan or Cliff Blakenship will catch for them. Fielder Jones is in the East at present and may persuade some of the big league players who intend to winter on the coast to come to Portland and play in the game.

Jones will hold down center field although it is not definitely known. Manager McCrede may decide to use his three star twirlers in the game, or may only use Veau Gregg throughout the session.

The Beavers will arrive here on Wednesday, November 9 and will start practice for the final game of the year.
