EUROPEAN WAR MAY COME ANY MINUTE

Greeks Seize German Vessel and Austria Delivers Ultimatum to Montenegro.

London, March 22.—Alarming dispatches of the seizure by Greek warships of the German steamer Irmingard off the island of Lemnos, in the Aegean sea, were received here today. No reason for her capture is given and diplomats are making frantic efforts to get further details. The Irmingard sailed from Barry, Wales, for Genoa February 28.

Dispatches from Berlin say the foreign office there has learned that armed operations against Montenegro by the Austrian navy may be expected soon. The Austrian squadron is now maneuvering off the Albanian and Montenegrin coasts. Other reports from Vienna stated that the Austrian government had addressed a strongly worded note, amounting practically to an ultimatum, to Montenegro.

Diplomats here are admittedly worried over the situation, the new crisis in the Balkans leading to the instant recall from Easter vacations of the ambassadors in London of the European powers.
