REMOVAL OF CONSUL AT JUAREZ IS NOW URGED

[UNITED PRESS RELEASED WIRE] Washington, July 23.—Congressman Smith of Texas urged Secretary Bryan today to summarily remove United States Consul Edwards at Juarez for alleged incompetence and failure to protect American refugees at Madera, Mexico. He said that 25 American women and children and 14 men were in great peril at Madera.

Edwards recently forbade a party of 50 Americans to go from Juarez to the relief of the Madera Americans. Smith asserts that Edwards favors the Mexican federalists and that he is misrepresenting the situation at Juarez.
