## AUSTRALIAN SWIMMER DIES DURING SWIM

Overcome By Cold Water and Never Regains Consciousness After Being Put into Boat.

### REMARKABLE RECORD AS LIFESAVER WAS GAINED

Fifty-Six Medals Given Him and Many Swimming Records Secured During Successful Career.

Seattle, Wash., March 2.—Arthur Cavill the Australian swimmer who was the first man to swim the Golden Gate at San Francisco, and who was recognized as the champion swimmer of the world from 1895 to 1900, died of exhaustion yesterday soon after an un-

successful attempt to swim across the Seattle harbor, a distance of three miles.

Cavill started from the west side of the bay and was swimming toward a pier at the foot of Spring street, on the central waterfront.

### Water Very Cold.

The water was cold and a strong wind and adverse currents took him out of his course, so that he swam fully four miles in the hour and ten minutes he was in the water. He was followed by a launch and a rowboat, which stood by to give assistance.

When Cavill was only 500 yards from the finish, where a large crowd had assembled, those in the rowboat saw him quit the powerful stroke with which he was swimming and lapse into a gentle paddle, as if resting. When the boatmen rowed to him Cavill grasped the gunwale and then became unconscious. He was picked up and taken to the launch, where medical attention was given him, but he died without regaining consciousness.

### Says Death Due to Cold.

The physicians who attended Cavill said the swimmer virtually was frozen to death. "His skin was like ice," said the physician, "and his circulation so retarded that his heart had stopped." The temperature of the water was 46 degrees above zero.

Cavill was 34 years old. He was born in London and during the last five years had made his home at Portland, Oregon. He held 56 medals for life-saving and had established many swimming records. One of his noted feats on the Pacific coast was swim-

ming the Tillamook, Oregon, bar with hands and feet tied. He was the originator of the "crawl" stroke in swimming.

## HAL CHASE IS HOLDOUT

THINKS \$30,000 FOR THREE YEARS AND \$5000 BONUS WOULD BE ABOUT RIGHT.

San Jose, March 2.—Hal Chase, first baseman of the Chicago White Sox, is a holdout, and it was learned yesterday that he has answered a request from the Federal league to name his terms his terms with a demand for \$30,000 for three years and a bonus of \$5000 for signing a contract. Chase, long known as Prince Hal, was for many years considered the greatest first baseman in the world.

Harry Wolter, right fielder of the New York Americans last year, who has been sold to Los Angeles, but has not signed, also is negotiating with the Federals.

### PULLEN IS AN EASY WINNER OF GRAND PRIX AUTO RACE

Los Angeles, March 2.—Edwin Pullen won the fifth Grand Prix race over 48 laps or 493 miles of the Santa Monica course Saturday afternoon. A new record of 77.3 miles per hour was established. It was also the first time in the history of the event that an Ameri-

can car flashed in first at the finish and there were several other features.

The winner gained his place by a serious accident—the first in the annals of the Santa Monica course—which jeopardized the life of driver J. B. Marquis, when his car, the most dangerous foreign motor in the contest, burned turtle at a turn and crushed him. He will recover.

Thereafter it was no race. Pullen was forty miles ahead of the second car at the finish and fifty-five miles ahead of the third.

CARRIES OFF HONORS BY NARROW MARGIN IN CONTEST WITH WILLAMETTE FIVE.

### PLAN AN ORGANIZATION CALLED CRIMINAL WASTE

LOGANBERRY GROWERS WILL SEEK TO BETTER THEIR CONDITION IN MARION COUNTY.

Plans for the organization of an association of loganberry growers of the state having as its object the development of the industry and the obtaining of adequate markets were drawn Saturday afternoon at a meeting of a committee appointed at a recent meeting of growers.

The committee will report at the next meeting, its most important recommendation to be the establishment of a bureau for the gathering of statistics. Having in its possession the number of growers, the acreage and other information along this line, it is believed that the association will be able each year to provide markets. It is expected that a large part of the crop in this section will be sold through a fruit union, and the same plan may be adopted in other sections of the state.

The committee appointed to draw up the by laws and outline the work of the association is composed of J. J. McDonald, Britt Aspinwall, C. W. Keene, W. T. Crowell and L. R. Roberts. Professor Lewis, of the Oregon Agricultural college attended the meeting of the committee Saturday, acting in an advisory capacity.

The acreage devoted to growing loganberries in this and other counties of the state has been so largely increased the past two years that the growers have feared they would suffer for lack of market. Various schemes for exploiting the berry have been adopted, and it is now believed that adequate markets are assured.

NAVY APPROPRIATION BILL IS HAPPHY BY MINORITY OF COMMITTEE AS EXTRAVAGANT.

Washington, Mar. 2.—Denounced by a minority of the committee as "inexcusably extravagant," and "a criminal waste of public funds," the navy appropriation bill has been reported to the house.

It carries a provision of \$120,064,333 for two battleships, six destroyers, one sea-going torpedo submarine, three coast defense submarines and four small torpedo boats. The navy departments' estimates were reduced by \$4,500,000.

Navy increases were authorized which will cost ultimately \$43,338,000, for which initial appropriations of \$17,500,000 were made.

The two dreadnaughts will cost \$15,000,000 each and will be built in private yards. The coast defense submarines will be built on the Pacific coast. The small torpedo boats will be stationed along the gulf coast.

Smaller appropriations included an increase in the number of navy chaplains from 24 to 53 and an increase in the allowance for Pearl harbor drydock from \$3,486,000 to \$4,968,000.

Authority was given to the secretary of the navy to report next year concerning the desirability of constructing federal armor plate plant with an annual capacity of 10,000 to 20,000 tons.

Those who signed the navy committee's minority report were Congressmen Witherspoon, Hansley, Buchanan and Gray. The proposed appropriation, they declared, exceeded the largest amount ever spent in one year by any nation on earth. The additional warships it was asserted, were wholly unnecessary.
