ATHLETIC NEWS

WEEK'S SPORT FEST ON IN CHICAGO TONIGHT

Scores of Athletes from Chicago and Other Places in West Gather for Big Windy City Carnival.

MAJORITY OF EVENTS WILL BE NON-COMPETITIVE

Club Takes Stand that Numbers of Purely Exhibition Nature Will Have More Stimulating Effect.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Chicago, March 24.—Scores of athletes from Chicago and other cities of the Middle West jugged about the indoor track at the Coliseum today in their final unlimbering efforts in preparation for the big athletic carnival opening tonight. For five nights some of the best known track and field men in the Central states will compete in the greatest indoor meet Chicago has ever known. The carnival was arranged by the new Sportsmen's Club of America, an organization headed by James A. Pugh, and formed for the purpose of encouraging athletics among all classes. Admission will be free. The majority of the events will be non-competitive, the club holding that events of purely exhibition nature will have a more stimulating effect in developing a real love of sport. Turner societies, gymnasium classes and similar organizations have accepted invitations to take part. While the program was designed particularly with a view to draw evening crowds, there will be exhibitions of archery, bowling, soccer, football, indoor baseball and several high school basketball games in the afternoons. High school athletes will furnish the program tonight, with relay races, exhibition drills, basketball and track games. Wednesday night will be known as "Amateur Athletic Federation" night, with a similar program, and on Thursday night the Amateur Athletic Union will be in charge of the games, with collegians entered. Turner societies, firemen's and policemen's organizations will compete Friday night. The carnival will close Saturday night with a series of special exhibitions arranged by the Sportsmen's club. The program as announced today, covers practically every branch of sport.

hereby abrogated and repealed insofar as they conflict herewith. This section is in all respect self-executing and immediately operative." Limit Put on Voting. The other proposed amendment is as follows: "Every legal voter may vote for any one candidate in the state for representative in the legislative assembly, and no more. The voter may write or stick on the ballot the name of the candidate he or she votes for when it is not printed on the ballot. The 60 candidates who receive the highest number of votes throughout the state shall be thereby elected. "A candidate's name shall be printed on the official ballot only in districts in which he or she resides. Every candidate nominated for representative may have not more than 20 words printed with his or her name on the official ballot, giving the name of the industrial, commercial or political organization or party by which the candidate is nominated, and his or her pledges to the people. "The vote for the election of representative in the legislative assembly shall be counted, canvassed and returned in like manner as heretofore in the election of joint representative from districts of two or more counties." The amendment is proposed to fit in between sections 16 and 17 of article 2 of the constitution and to be known as section 16a.

DECLARATION FOR INITIATIVE ARE FILED WITH SECRETARY OF STATE

Declarations for the initiation of constitutional amendments abolishing the state senate and providing for proportional representation in the legislative assembly, championed by officers of the State Federation of Labor, Farmers' Union, Farmers' Society of Equity, People's Power League and the Oregon State Grange, were filed with Secretary of State Oleott yesterday. It is proposed to submit the amendments at the election in November. The proposed amendment for the abolition of the state senate says: "Article four shall be amended by adding to it: 'The senate and office of senator in the legislative assembly of Oregon are hereby abolished.
