DELAY IN COAL BILL WOULD WORK HARM

Washington, June 1.—Despite Secretary of the Interior Lane's plea for the elimination of the red tape which, he says, is seriously hampering the administration of Alaskan affairs, there will be no legislation at this session of congress along the line he advocates.

Senator Walsh of Montana, of the committee on territories made this plain today. Lane particularly desired the passage of the Chamberlain bill providing for the government of Alaska by a commission, extraordinarily empowered to promote the territory's development. "The coal bill," said Senator Walsh, "is much more important and pressing than the bill providing a new form of government. The later can wait, but to delay the coal bill would involve dire consequences. I do not think it will be possible to do more for Alaska at this session than to pass the coal bill, which supplements the railroad bill even, if we are able to get the coal bill through before adjournment."

REPORT FINDING IRVING'S BODY.

Quebec, June 1.—It was reported here this afternoon that the body of Laurence Irving, the actor, had been found on the banks of the St. Lawrence river near where the wreck of the Empress of Ireland lies. As the face was bruised beyond recognition, identification was said to have been made by a heavy ring, bearing the initials "L. I." A piece of cambrie, believed to have been torn from his wife's dress, was said to have been clutched in his right hand.

STOCK MARKET DULL.

New York, June 1.—Price changes were very narrow except for a few special stocks, in the early stock market today. Business was very dull. Missouri Pacific rose 1/4, Texas Pacific 2. Later Missouri Pacific fell back to the opening figures on fears of an unfavorable decision this afternoon regarding its note extension plan. Trading was dull all day, and closed nominal.

The rebel general, Natera, according to reports received here, is within 20 miles of Guadalajara and has the way open for General Obregon to march with his rebel force on Mexico City.

The federal gunboat Guerrero is at Mazatlan.

Mazatlan in Darkness. Mazatlan has been left in darkness, the water supply having been cut off, and there is no power to make electricity.

The rebels made a daring capture of supplies intended for the federals in Mazatlan harbor tonight. With some rowing up in canoes and with another party in a steam launch, they captured three barges loaded with provisions. The barges were lying alongside the schooner Garibaldi.
