Geese, 18c. ***** SIX HUNDRED SAILORS TAKE PART IN MOVIES ***** Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 16.—While crowds lined the streets of San Diego, standing for the most part in silent admiration, but with occasional splutterings of handclapping, 600 sailors from the battleships Missouri, Ohio and Wisconsin came ashore here today in launches and whale boats, marched briskly aboard special trains and were whirled away to Universal City, the capital of "movieland," where a special program was staged for their benefit. The little fleet (varying between 500 and 600 midshipmen from Annapolis naval academy, on their annual cruise, arrived in the harbor before the early morning mists had cleared away. When the fog thinned watchers on the shore saw the three squat, grim fighting craft moored so close to shore that their decks could be plainly seen on their bows, and now and then a few mellow single notes could be heard. Brigadier General Robert Wankowski, of the National Guard, and representatives of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce, made an official visit of welcome to Admiral Fullam, commanding the squadron, shortly after its arrival. None of the midshipmen were seen by plain folks on land, however, until they began arriving at the wharves at noon for their motorizing tour of Los Angeles and vicinity. Numbers of the midshipmen were entertained at the Jonathan and other exclusive clubs.

Ex-President Taft Says Intervention Is Due

St. Louis, Aug. 16.—"Intervention in Mexico seems necessary today; the United States can no longer tolerate the confusion and disorder in our neighboring republic," declared former President William Howard Taft in an interview here today. "I am in favor of peace but not in this foolish sense of security without foundation," said Taft. "Today it looks as if the United States must intervene in Mexico. This would require 250,000 soldiers. At the time I left office I was considering a plan to recognize Huerta. In my judgment this country made a mistake when it ousted him." Taft will address St. Louis business men today.

Two Men Beaten Up in Street Fight Yesterday

Oliver Reibeck and Jack Campbell were each given 10 days in the city jail this morning by Municipal Judge Elgin on charges of fighting preferred by J. E. Wilson and Joseph Goebel. According to the police Reibeck and Campbell and three others met Wilson and Goebel near the corner of Twelfth and Trade streets and engaged in a few words which lead to an altercation and they went at it hammer and tongs. One of the victims was obliged to have a doctor take five stitches over his eye and both were badly bruised. Only Reibeck and Goebel were arrested as Reibeck, in particular, has a local police record. Both men entered pleas of guilty in police court and took the sentence.
