Only two farmers had vegetables and fruits on display this morning at the public market on Ferry street, near Liberty. As the market has not been very widely advertised, there was but little demand from the town folks.

C. O. Constable, county fruit inspector, returned last evening from a week's work searching for fire blight between Talbot and Fairfield, in the section between these two places about four miles east of the city.

Fine specimens of Soudan grass are on display at the real estate office of Scott & Byson, brought in by R. D. Halsey, living on 1200 North Fourth, Salem. The grass was sowed April 4, and the first cutting is also seven feet high, the second cutting being five feet and the third now about two feet. Mr. Halsey is of the opinion that Soudan grass is about the best forage for the grown in this country, as it will yield three crops a year and comes in during the summer months, just when feed is needed.

Plans are being made for welcome arches to be erected before the beginning of the state fair, to be placed at the entrance of the grounds. The arch will be in the form of a span 10 feet with 12 foot columns supporting, so made that the motto can be changed to suit the occasion. They will be constructed of canvas and wood, and made into separate parts bolted together, so that the whole span can be easily taken down, stored, and again used as occasion may require.

The Spaulding Logging company is installing this week at the mill on Front street, a new band re-saw, which will increase the cut of the mill from 10,000 to 20,000 feet a day.

R. D. Teater of the Rosedale district has an unusually fine crop of prunes this year and is hooper enough for Oregon to give several crates of his finest to the Willamette Valley Exposition association, to be shipped to the Willamette valley exhibit in the Oregon building at the exposition.

The Spaulding Logging company today is shipping a car load of the Indiana silos to North Yakima for distribution in that territory. This is the second car load shipped this month, the other going to Laws, Cal., for distribution. This Indiana silo is manufactured and sold on the Pacific coast exclusively by the Spaulding Logging company.

A tennis tournament, one that will be open to all the tennis enthusiasts in the state, will be held in this city the week before the state fair. Games will be played at the Asylum courts, and as it will be an open tournament, quite a number of players from Portland, Albany, Eugene and other cities in the valley are expected to take part.

The municipal bathing beach has been doing a fair business this week and will be open for the public tomorrow. Arthur Wilson is still in charge, and says as long as the public wants to take advantage of the beach, the show will be kept running and he will be in charge as usual.

According to announcement received today, the Rev. Barr G. Lee, who has recently been living in Portland, will succeed the Rev. Charles Wilson Dancy, as rector of St. George Episcopal church at Roseburg. The Rev. Dancy resigned to give his time to his real estate interests. The Rev. Lee preceded Rev. E. S. Gill of this city as rector of St. Paul's church.

While unhitching a team today noon at the Ferry street feed barn, Chauncey Putnam, son of Marlon Putnam, was seriously injured when kicked in the stomach by one of the horses. Dr. E. E. Fisher was called in attendance and the injured man taken at once to the Sanitarium. Late this afternoon it was feared that he might have received serious internal injuries.

The fine collection of hops and vines recently sent to San Francisco for the Oregon building is attracting much attention, according to a letter received today by Fred S. Byson, from O. E.

Freitag. They are draped on the log pillars at the front of the Willamette valley exhibit and add much to the attractiveness of this part of the valley display.

The presentation of past grand master's jewels that was to have taken place next Wednesday at the lodge rooms of the I. O. O. F., Chiemeketa lodge, No. 1, next Wednesday evening, has been postponed until the evening of Wednesday, September 22. The postponement was on account of other affairs in the city that prevented the attendance of many of the local members.

The public fountain on the sidewalk in front of the Capital National bank will be supplied with water from a cooling room inside the bank that will guarantee cold water at all times, regardless of the amount drawn. The cooling room is supplied with a new system of pipes, with a total length of 300 feet, and is large enough for one of the largest cakes of ice from the local factory.
