STATE NEWS

Cottage Grove Sentinel: C. M. Kidd, who lives about two miles west of town had a buggy and harness stolen Friday night. Marshal Pitcher was notified and soon got into the thief's trail, which led to Coana and thence to Oakland. From Louisa Mr. Pitcher contacted the thief at Oakland, who arrested the officer. However, the latter made his getaway while the officer was phoning Pitcher and is still at large. When the thief arrived at Oakland he had added a horse to his outfit, which then consisted of the horse, buggy and harness, all of which Marshal Pitcher turned over to Mr. Kidd. No doubt it is a stolen horse and will be called for later by the owner.

Junction City Times: A thousand bushels of corn, raised on twenty acres, is the creditable crop disposed of to Junction City this week by S. A. Hughes, who lives six miles southeast of town on the river road. All this in spite of repeated declarations that corn cannot be successfully grown in the Willamette valley. Mr. Hughes states that this year's crop is not quite up to previous fields as he has raised as high as seventy bushels to the acre. Part of the corn, which is selling around a cent a pound, was purchased by A. J. Kaiser.

Portland Livestock Reporter: Nearly every section of the northwest is represented this morning by hog shipments. Sections of the country which two or three years ago never heard the squeal of a hog are regularly represented on our market. The same grower of cattle, hogs or sheep pays no attention to the ups and downs of the market; he goes ahead year after year with a conservative amount of stock on his place, knowing that the general average for a term of years makes his business a very profitable one. Although the wheat market is weak in Portland, with a decline of two and three cents, the local market in Salem is still holding to the 85 cent price a bushel. Oats are firm at 35 cents. Fresh ranch eggs are pretty scarce, resulting in another advance today. Grocers are paying 40 cents in trade, and 38 cents cash. Storage eggs are worth 28 cents. With the advance for fresh eggs wholesale to 40 cents, the retail price jumped to 45 cents. The retail on storage eggs is 30 cents.
