New York, Oct. 28.—J. P. Morgan was operated on for appendicitis at his home at noon today according to an announcement from his office.

The statement said: "Mr. Morgan was at his office Wednesday. Yesterday he was indisposed and remained at his home in Glen Cove. Physicians discovered he was suffering with a mild attack of appendicitis. In order to guard against a recurrence, it was decided to remove his appendix. The operation was performed by Mrs. Markoe, Lyle and Smith. His general condition is excellent."

A member of the firm stated that the wounds inflicted by Hott had absolutely nothing to do with Morgan's condition.

The operation was successful and Morgan is now resting comfortably at his Glen Cove home. His physicians expected a perfect recovery.
