FORMER AUSTRIAN CONSUL IS ACCUSED

Dr. Goricar Is Charged With Working For Allied Interests

Washington, Nov. 12.—Dr. Josef Goricar, former Austrian consul at San Francisco, was accused in an Austrian embassy statement today of plotting with Russian and Serbian agents, intent on disseminating disloyalty among Austro-Hungarian emigrants.

This statement was issued in response to the Providence Journal's publication today of a story in which Goricar was quoted as saying that the country is honeycombed with German and Austrian spies, directly under German Ambassador Von Bernstorff and Austrian Consul General Nuber of New York.

Moreover, Goricar charged that every Austro-Hungarian consulate in the country is a "hotbed of propaganda for the destruction of munition factories, for the creation of strikes among labor men working in such factories

and for every act of violence that is being committed here having these objects in view."

Perhaps the most startling claim was that naval attacks of the Austrian embassy at Washington sought last year, when Goricar was stationed at San Francisco, to have him obtain plans of all the fortifications and defenses of San Francisco harbor and the Pacific coast.

He claimed, the Journal said, that he was instructed particularly to get every possible detail of the operation activities, machinery contents and the strength of the Bremerton navy yard on Puget Sound.

Refusing to get these facts, the paper said, he was transferred in April to Berlin and later ordered to Vienna.

Instead, fearing that because of his pro-Slavic affiliations he would be imprisoned or killed, according to the paper, he fled to Rome and later resigned.

Von Nuber and the German privy councillor at New York were particularly denounced by Goricar, who claimed they were engaged in activities daily sufficient to drive them from the country.

The department of justice announced that it would start an immediate investigation of Goricar's charge that American Correspondent Archibald knew the contents of the papers he carried abroad for Austrian Ambassador Dumba, which later caused the American request for the ambassador's withdrawal from this country.

The embassy's statement concerning Goricar said:

"Goricar was on a leave of absence at the outbreak of the war, and was temporarily attached to the Austro-Hungarian consulate at Berlin. There he learned that the Austro-Hungarian authorities were informed of his secret connections with Austria-Hungary's enemies. Evidently fearing detection, he suddenly left his post without permission and disappeared. Later it was learned he went to Rome whereupon he resigned, thereby preventing his dismissal."

While in Rome he was close to Russian and Serbian agents, obviously for the purpose of going to America to use his knowledge of the centers of Slavic immigration, with the intention of disseminating disloyalty among our immigrants against their native country. The Austro-Hungarian embassy is informed that a number of southern Slavs from Austria-Hungary left America to fight against the Austro-Hungarians.

"The embassy has been informed for several months of this but refrained from taking counter measures, being aware of the disgrace from the fact that former officers had broken their faith and allegiance to the fatherland."

In view, however, of these accusations against representatives of Austria-Hungary, the embassy emphatically declares them false and absolutely baseless, as silence would be taken as an acknowledgment and would create the belief that our consulates are engaged in activities in violation of American laws."

Three Accidents Reported From Marion County

Out of a total of 195 accidents to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending yesterday three were from Marion county. George Snell, of Salem, injured his hand in a saw mill, Joe Jennings, of Silverton, suffered a sprained ankle in a saw mill, and Clifford Bussey, of Salem, was fatally injured in a railroad accident.

Of the total number reported 140 were subject to the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation act; 20 were from public utility corporations; 29 were from firms and corporations who have rejected the provisions of the act; and 6 were from firms or corporations who do not employ labor in hazardous occupations.

Following is shown the number of accidents by industry: Sawmill 42, logging 20, construction 25, iron and steel 8, paper mills 12, meat packing 11, railroad operation 18, light and power 6, department store 9, mining 5, paving 4, and two for each of the following: Warehouse, oil company, woolen mill, irrigation company, planing mill 3, and one each for the following, bakery, fuel company, sand and gravel, lumber merchant, stevedoring, ice manufacturing company, lime and gypsum, blacksmith, rope manufacturing company, brass works, creamery, hotel, auto works, rock crushing, dredging, machine shop, flour mills, wholesale paper company, paint manufacturing company, box factory, transportation company, express company, trespasser on railroad, and traveler on highway.
