Salem City Directory Is Forty-Four Years Old

Business firms in the city of Salem 44 years ago were liberal advertisers, especially when approached to advertise in the first directory to be issued. The Salem directory for 1871, of which a copy is now owned by David A. Johnson of this city, and whose name appears in the directory as a resident at that time, is well filled with the announcements of the business men of that day. The directory was compiled by J. Henry Brown, and published by E. M. Waite, successor to A. L. Stinson, book and job printer.

Ladd & Bush, bankers, announce in a half page ad that they buy and sell greenbacks, government securities, coin and currency drafts, and that valuations are received on deposit for safe keeping. Gilbert Bros., of which A. N. Gilbert and J. W. Gilbert composed the firm, advertised as importers and manufacturers of boots and shoes, and that highest prices were paid for hides and furs. On the back cover of the 1871 directory was the announcement of M. Meyer & Son, importers and dealers in custom made clothes and dry goods, boots and shoes.

Breyman Bros., located in the Moore block, on Commercial street, three doors from the corner, were dealers in foreign and domestic dry goods and also hats, caps, groceries, crockery and hardware. George H. Himes advertised as a job printer in Portland. Snyder & Cook were in the book binding business in the Griswold block, and Yenton & Boon carried a line of books, toys, pianos and organs and stated that they defied competition. The Belvedere saloon was on Commercial street, and the Oriflamme saloon, with Robert Bean proprietor, was located opposite the Chemeketa house. Doctors were also advertisers 44 years ago, as Drs. Carpenter and Chase had their offices on Liberty street, nearly opposite the Congregational church.

Number 1 of Volume One of Leslie's Is Found in Salem

Mrs. G. W. Johnson, of this city, recently found the first issue of Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper, issued December 15, 1855. The front page contains a wood cut of a few of the survivors of the ill-fated Arctic expedition of Sir John Franklin and a full account of the adventures of the survivors. The paper is crammed full of news of all sorts with the foreign news in epitome. Correspondents from the wilds of the far west supplied stories from California and among these items is the following: "The Chinese are leaving California. The discriminating tax upon foreign miners, under which the Chinese are now compelled to pay \$72 per annum into the state treasury, and which is to be increased \$24 each succeeding year, will necessarily induce their speedy departure from the mines. The 'Challenger' which sailed November 1, for Hong Kong, carried 400 Chinese passengers." It appears that several of the Mongolians have since come back.

Another California item says, "Two men, whose names are given as Blake and Butler, were murdered at Vallejo, Calaveras county, on the 24th ult. They had been pursuing some horse thieves, and coming up with them, a fight ensued which resulted as above stated." An editorial says, "Professor Longfellow has been detected in a rather barefaced plagiarism. His new Indian poem of 'Hiawatha' turns out to be nothing more than an ingenious paraphrase of the 'Kalevala,' or great national epic of the Finns." A letter from the Carolinians states "The South Carolina legislature met on Monday, the 25th ultimo. The governor's message was sent on the following day. It is a very short communication. The paper fails to state whether or not this is the famous message from the governor of South Carolina that is so frequently quoted."

STATE NEWS

Medford Mail: The Rogue River Canal company will put nearly a hundred men to work in the construction of the main canal extending toward the Central Point district as soon as the weather will permit the work being done to advantage. They will begin near the Pacific highway near the junction of the P. & E. line with the S. P. on the W. H. Gore place and push the extension work rapidly.

The Dalles Chronicle: William (Bill) Smith killed three bears within seven miles of Tygh valley recently. The largest weighed 200 pounds, and the hide, when stretched, measured six feet two inches at the hips. Mr. Smith says he has killed eight bears in the last three years. Forty-three coyotes and seven wild cats were trapped by him during the summer.

Lake County Examiner: Among the recent incorporations created by the state is the name of the Junior Agricultural college and Trade School. The body was organized to provide a real home for the orphans and homeless boys from all parts of Oregon, and to so train them that they will become useful citizens.

Pendleton Tribune: H. M. Woolen, of The Dalles, who is repairing vias in Pendleton this week, has in his possession a violin made in 1746, in Comome, Italy, by the Italian, Joseph Guernier. Professor Bert McDonald stated that the instrument has a sweeter tone than any he has ever heard played before.

Rogue River Courier: L. A. Levensoler, who put in some days in the copper districts tributary to Grants Pass, going through as far as Crescent City, a couple of months ago, is here again, and is now visiting the Haweliga mine with Dr. Reddy. Mr. Levensoler represents the Tacoma Smelting company and is making a critical examination of the copper deposits in southern Oregon for his people, he being a mining engineer, and his reports may have a wonderful influence upon the future development in this district.

Pendleton Tribune: E. S. Catron, federal game warden for the northwest, who has been making a trip over the duck and goose territory of Eastern Oregon, says that birds are more plentiful this year than ever, and attributes the increase to the protection given

them under the federal migratory bird law.
