## COURT HOUSE NEWS

Judge William Galloway of department No. 2 of the circuit court, went to Albany today to hold court in that city. He will return to Salem tomorrow.

Elva Armitage was given a decree of divorce yesterday by Judge Galloway from her husband, Sylvester Armitage. The couple were married in 1907, but the plaintiff declared that of late years her husband acquired a roving disposition and that in his ramblings he was accompanied by other women and that his continued actions constituted cruel and inhuman treatment. She secured the care and custody of Dale, the six year old son of the couple, and alimony of \$15 per month.

M. F. Phillips has filed a suit in the circuit court against L. C. Eastburn to collect money alleged due on three promissory notes of \$175, \$25 and \$250 respectively. The plaintiff seeks to recover the principal and interest on all the notes and attorneys fees totaling \$95. An attachment was filed on \$150 worth of land in connection with the controversy. W. C. Winstlow is attorney for the plaintiff.

Lina H. Brown has filed a suit in the circuit court to recover the possession of two horses which it is alleged are wrongfully detained by Constable E. Cooper and C. W. Gillingham. One horse, a two year old gelding is said to be valued at \$150 and the other a black yearling filly is valued at \$100 and in addition the plaintiff seeks \$50 damages and the costs of the action. Smith & Shields represent the plaintiff.

Upon the petition of S. Z. Culver, guardian of William Townsend, an insane person, Judge Bushey today issued an order requiring that \$25 per month be paid from the funds of the estate to Mrs. Lena Leuzenbaugh, a daughter of the ward who will assume the care of her father. Townsend has been confined in the asylum but will be removed to the home of his daughter, in Portland.

Judge Bushey today issued an order confirming the loan of \$975 secured by a mortgage on realty by the guardian of the estate of Sarah Jane Watt, an insane person.

A marriage license was issued by the county clerk this afternoon to Ivan Bell Miller, a laborer of this city, and Mary Alice Plummer, also of Salem. The wedding will take place Christmas day.

After an examination by a physician County Judge Bushey today ordered Shelby Cornwell committed to the Oregon state hospital for the insane. Cornwell is said to be an alcoholic and addicted to the use of drugs.

An inventory and appraisal in the matter of the estate of Gertrude Meyer was filed today in the probate court by Robert Wenger, Joseph Ramsdort and Joseph Gertz, appraisers. The appraisal shows the estate to consist of real property to the value of \$7,575 and notes and cash to the value of \$6,955 or a total of \$14,530.

The estate of Mathias Cooley, who died December 8, was offered for probate and the petition states that the real property is valued at \$15,000 and the personal at \$8,000. The heirs are William E. Cooley, a widow; Cornelius J. Cooley, a son; McGirt F. Cooley, a son, all residing at Silverton; Sampson Willis Cooley, two sons residing in Silverton, Matilda Danon, a daughter, of Vancouver; Birdie R. Miller, a daughter of Albany; Jennie J. Cunningham, a daughter of Silverton; and Vernon M. Suckow, a grandson, residing at Silverton. McGirt Cooley and Cornelius J. Cooley were named as joint administrators of the estate.

## CALLING ATTENTION TO OREGON SCENERY

### Southern Pacific Issuing Artistic Literature On Beauties of the State

To divert travel through Portland as a gateway to the south, the Southern Pacific Company has recently issued a series of travel letters, each letter descriptive of certain sections through which the railway passes after leaving Portland. Letters one to three are descriptive of Oregon and are intended to give the traveller an idea of the scenic beauties of the state as he travels through the Willamette Valley into the mountainous country of the Rogue and Umpqua rivers.

Letters No. 1 is descriptive of Portland, the "City of Roses," and also as the starting point for a ride over the famous Columbia River Highway, which skirts the bank of the Columbia for more than 100 miles. It is paved as smooth as any city street for a distance of 45 miles. This letter also makes note of the views to be obtained on Mount Hood, Jefferson, Adams, St. Helens and Rainier.

The beauties of the Willamette valley are described and illustrated in letter No. 2. Reference is made to the Willamette Falls at Oregon City and also the fact that three fourths of the people in the state live in the Willamette valley. Mention is made of Salem as follows: "Salem is the capital of the state and as the train pulls into this city, the state capital building and the new supreme court building will attract your attention. I dare say you will be impressed by the clean well-paved streets, the modern business buildings and attractive residences of the city." Albany is referred to as an attractive city of 5,000 from which a fine view of Mount Jefferson can be secured.

The third letter, with illustrations of Mt. McLoughlin, Crater Lake and the entrance to the Cow creek canyon, carries the traveller to Eugene, described as a city of 9,000. Beyond Eugene the Willamette valley is left behind, the traveller passing into the Cow Creek Canyon on the Umpqua valley.

Rogue River valley, famed for its peaches and fruits generally, is the home of three of Oregon's wide awake cities. Grants Pass is the gateway to the famous Josephine county caves and Medford is the city from which automobile parties start for Crater Lake. Ashland is becoming known as the "Carlsbad of America," and is the possessor of several mineral springs, developed by the community.

These descriptive letters will be mailed to all passenger agents in the country and the interested descriptions of the scenery from Portland to general California will do much, according to the opinion of the general passenger agent, towards bringing travel to this part of Oregon.

## TURNER PUBLIC SCHOOLS

(Capital Journal Special Service)

Turner, Or., Dec. 21.—Friday, Dec. 24th will be the end of three months of school, and also the last day before the holiday vacation. The school board has given one week vacation this year. After this week of vacation the students will return to work on January 3. This will allow one and one-half months work before mid-year examinations. Under the exemption rule announced by Principal Wilson at the first of the year every student making an average of 98 per cent in department and an average of 90 per cent in each and every subject will be exempt from mid-year examinations. In addition to students making this average will be given time off during the examination days.

This rule gives the student something to work for, it makes him careful about department and careful to keep all subjects up to the 90 per cent mark.

The Palmer Method Writing Penants and Position Charts were received and placed in each room last week.

Friday afternoon, Dec. 24th, the High School Literary Society will give a program, at which time the students will discuss the subject which the High schools of the state are to debate, viz., Resolved that, the United States should adopt the essentials of the Swiss system of military training.

It is expected that County Superintendent Smith and a number of other county superintendents will be present at that time as it is understood that Mr. Smith has promised a come and bring some of the other county's educators.

There are some twelve to fifteen districts in this part of the county which naturally will send to the Turner High school in the near future. With the splendid equipment which is being put in and with a student body which is enthusiastic there is no reason why Turner should not have next year a high school of fifty or more students. It is expected that there will be many students enter after the holidays or at mid-year as some have already indicated such intentions.

## Trial of Alleged Chinese Gamblers On In Police Court

Six Chinese gamblers were called to trial this afternoon in police court before Judge Elgert to answer a charge of gambling. Eight arrests were made but Rih and Oyo, two Japanese, failed to appear and their bail was de-layed forfeited. Leon Gong, Gin, Wang, Jim, Lem Sing and Lee lined up inside the rail behind Attorneys Hall and Guy O. Smith and Harry Goug, a Chinese attorney, from Portland.

The trial was called at 2 o'clock and the examination of the jurors began. Paul Haiser, A. H. Marwood, Cooke Patton, Claude Bell, Mr. Walker and Vincent Beno were the jurors. The line of questioning of the defense indicated that the Chinese would maintain that they were playing cards for amusement only and that if they wanted to play among themselves it was their own business and that fan tan was no more dangerous than bridge whist.

The evidence offered by the city was given by police officers Stubbs, Varney and Nicholson who made the raid some time ago on one of the rooms in a building just south of the O. E. depot on high street. The officers found 11 Chinese and two Japs in the room but two of the Chinese escaped, the other eleven were brought to the police station and eight were booked and put up \$25 bail for each to appear in police court after the return of City Attorney Triudie who was then in the east.

The officers testified that they broke open the door of the room and found the Chinese grouped about a table upon which was a fan tan layout, money to the amount of \$24.80 and other gambling paraphernalia. The defense had not offered any testimony at press time this afternoon and the indications were that a verdict would not be returned until a late hour this evening.
