EIGHT GO DRY TONIGHT

(By United Press.)
Washington, D. C., Dec. 31.—Nine states in the United States will go dry in 1916, eight of them at midnight tonight and one, Virginia, November 1, 1916. The eight are Alabama, South Carolina, Idaho, Arkansas, Colorado, Washington, Oregon and Iowa. This will make a total of 18 dry and 29 wet states of a total of 48. The states heretofore dry and the year each became so, are: Maine, 1851; Kansas, 1889; North Dakota, 1889; Georgia and Oklahoma, 1907; Mississippi and North Carolina, 1908; Tennessee, 1909 and Arizona and West Virginia, 1916. Alaska, Vermont, Indiana, Nebraska and South Dakota will vote on prohibition in 1916. If these four states go dry, practically half of the United States will be dry. National prohibition through state prohibition is considered probable within a very few years by leading prohibitionists.

Twenty Thousand Barrels of Beer To Be Wasted

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 31.—Twenty thousand barrels of draught beer will be poured into the gutter here before January 10, if Federal Judge Cushman, of Tacoma, denies the Seattle Brewing and Malting company, its petition to enjoin Attorney General Tanner from confiscating \$50,000 worth of brew that it will be unable to move within the allotted time.

Washington's dry law requires that all such liquor be seized and destroyed 10 days after the law becomes operative.

"It will be impossible to get the stuff out of the state in that time," said Louis Hemrich, president of the brewing company today.

"There is no shore washed by the ocean on which we do not land our beer—Japan, China, South Asia and as far east as Ceylon and the Indies. We cannot get transportation facilities enough to handle it."

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Meier declared that in case Judge Cushman refused the injunction the law would have to take its course.

"We have had a year to meet this so-called emergency," he said. "If they have not removed their stock, it is not the fault of the people who passed the law."

SCHOONER IS RESCUED

Marshfield, Ore., Dec. 31.—With her crew of three men exhausted from lack of water and food, the gasoline schooner Enterprise, bound from Astoria to Waldport, was towed into Coos bay this morning by the steamer Adeline Smith. Her engines were flooded and she was badly battered in a 75 mile gale Tuesday night.

Yesterday morning the schooner's supplies of water and food ran out and matters were growing desperate for the crew when the steamer Willamette picked the Enterprise up off Hecla Head last night. Captain Parker said five vessels were given the distress signal, but none of them stopped.

TWENTY-ONE HUNDRED SALOONS CLOSE DOORS

This Will Happen At Midnight Tonight, and Their Doors Will Remain Closed Indefinitely—Tables In Cafes In Big Cities For Tonight's Use Are At A Premium—Washington and Idaho Will Have Another Vote On Subject But In Oregon It Is In The Constitution.

THE LAW TOMORROW

Washington.
If you want to get liquor you must go to the office of the county clerk in person swear to an affidavit and secure a permit.

You must send the permit to a liquor dealer outside the state and he must paste it on the package of liquor which he ships you.

You may not have shipped to you more than two quarts of strong liquor nor more than 24 quarts of beer in any period of 30 days.

Oregon.
You must order liquor from outside the state and it must be delivered to you in person.

On delivery you must sign an affidavit which is later kept on file in the county clerk's office.

You may not receive more than two quarts of strong liquor nor more than 24 quarts of beer in any period of four weeks.

Idaho.
This is the only "dry-as-a-bone" state of the three. The Idaho law prohibits the manufacture and sale, and also the receipt in the state of any intoxicating liquors.

the law automatically goes on the ball again. In Idaho the voters will pass on the amendment which will give constitutional authority to the law already passed by the legislature. Oregon wets already are taking steps to circulate petitions which will again put the prohibition question before the voters this Fall.

Lawyers have declared that, with the Washington supreme court decision, there isn't a loophole in either the Oregon or Washington law. There isn't even a flaw in the drug store provision, they point out. Drug stores cannot sell liquor for any purpose. The nearest to genuine "booze" they can sell is ethyl alcohol. Some druggists might contend that "10 proof" corn whisky is nothing but ethyl alcohol, but there's so much red tape connected with buying even a little ethyl alcohol that it would be a long time before any drug store for anyone who hoped to evade the law in this way.

San Francisco Will Welcome Incoming Year

San Francisco, Dec. 31.—San Francisco tonight will give the New Year one of the biggest, most enthusiastic—and most expensive—greetings ever extended a new comer by every city. Hustle and bustle marked every one of the big cafes and hotels today, in preparation for the huge throngs which will celebrate tonight. San Franciscans are getting ready to bring the successful exposition year to an equally successful—if somewhat blatant—close.

Half a million horns, 5,000 sacks of confetti, three million serpentine rolls or "throws" will be consumed in the fun making.

Experts say at least 50,000 persons will spend their New Year's eve down town in the big cafes or hotels, and that they will spend on an average of \$5 apiece. Reservations at tables in the larger hotels and cafes ranged today from \$4 to \$8, and in some places higher, per person.

It is expected tonight's wine bill will total \$50,000; other drinks \$75,000 and etables \$150,000. Another \$25,000 it is figured will be used for paraphernalia for celebrating.

Timely Warning Saves California Citrus Crop

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 31.—Timely warning enabled citrus ranchers in southern California to successfully fight the killing frost which threatened oranges and lemons early this morning. With another freeze predicted for tonight, preparations for extensive smudging were made. The weather has not been so cold as it was two years ago when ranchers had such a hard battle to save their crops.

Films of ice nearly half an inch thick formed on pools around Oxnard this morning. Smudges were lighted in all the big citrus groves, and no damage was reported.

The Limoneira Lemon company of Santa Paula reported a minimum temperature of 26 degrees. Smudges were used and it is thought the crops escaped harm. In the big freeze of 1913 the mercury hit 15 degrees.

A light rain last evening tempered frosts in districts south of Los Angeles.

Blasius Grasser Now Up For Parole After Serving Year In Pen

Among the cases of convicts at the state pen to be considered for a parole next month is that of Blasius Grasser, who was sent up from this county last January on a charge of murdering Alva Bacon, a 17 year old boy, as he was going across a fence at the corner of Grasser's land. Grasser was convicted of manslaughter and received a sentence of from one to 15 years in the pen. As he has served his minimum he is now up for parole.
