WHITE SOX WILL DROP SEVEN FROM ITS LIST

Chicago, Jan. 24.—Clarence Rowland, manager of the Chicago White Sox, intimated that a large slice will be taken off the list of Sox regulars and aspirants who already have affixed their John Henry to 1916 contracts.

Rowland now has 24 players under contract. When the Sox leave for the training camp only 27 of the 34 will be among those present. Among those who are hoping to stick with the 27 are a number of former Pacific Coast leaguers, including Jack Neas, Oakland first baseman, and Zeb Terry and Fred McCullin, Los Angeles infielders.

Dispute With Coach

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 24.—An open breach and legal controversy between former Pothall Coach Edwald Stiehm and the University of Nebraska athletic board today appeared certain. The university threatens legal steps to secure possession of athletic records of the university which Stiehm claims as his personal property.

Dr. R. G. Clapp, chairman of the board, and Guy E. Reed, manager of athletics, called at Stiehm's residence here and requested Stiehm to give them up. They were given three minutes to get out of the house. Stiehm is six feet five inches in height. The visitors left in two and a half minutes.

Sheriff Esch Snow Bound In Reno For Three Days Last Week

Sheriff William Esch, who returned to this city yesterday with Adam J. Mishler in custody, was compelled to remain in Reno, Nevada, from Tuesday until Friday of last week on account of the snow blocking up the railroad tracks. While in Reno Sheriff Esch was the guest of Sheriff Charles Ferrell, who is a former Salem citizen and has been sheriff of Washoe county for 12 years. Sheriff Ferrell formerly resided in North Salem and at present has a brother, James Ferrell, who is a barber in this city. Another brother, George Ferrell, resides with his mother at Brooks. Frank Ferrell, another brother, was the first man killed by Harry Tracy when the famous outlaw made his escape from the Oregon penitentiary. Ferrell was a guard in the machine shops where Tracy and Merrill were working.

Sheriff Esch found Reno to be a city of 15,000 inhabitants with 60 saloons and although the city is largely made up of people engaged in mining or stock raising, the sheriff says it is an orderly city and that during the incumbency of Sheriff Ferrell the wild western frontier has been reduced to an orderly, law abiding city. Sheriff Ferrell is the man who policed the Jeffries-Johnson fight crowd and he has built up a reputation as an efficient officer that holds the confidence and respect of the entire county where he continues to be re-elected with a regularity that is almost a habit.

SMOKER TO BE STAGED FOR BOXING FANS AT RYAN HALL TONIGHT

Under the able direction of Bernie Goldberg, a leading promoter of fistic bouts and other sports of Portland, a smoker will be staged in Ryan's hall on South Commercial street this evening. Ardent followers of the great manly art in Salem will have an opportunity to pass judgment upon some of the lads who put the X in box when Mr. Goldberg lines up his string—six of 'em in all.

Among the star actors who have been making Portland fans sit up straight and who are attracting attention all over the Northwest, is Muff Brownson, a veritable whirlwind on foot and possessor of a pair of hands which resemble playful lightning when in action. Brownson has gained the rightful reputation of a "comer" in the fight realm on the coast and his head and foot work tonight promises to measure up fairly with that which placed his name in prominence. The speedy one's opponent will be Siles Rexter, also of Portland. Rexter is somewhat of a veteran in the boxing sport and is generally a favorite with all who see him in action. In any event, Rexter without doubt will stir up something pretty lively for Brownson and Mr. Goldberg is confident that the Salem enthusiasts will witness six rounds of A-1 work when these two fellows square off.

Valley Trambutus vs. Tad Derbarish will furnish the spectators with the star performance of the evening. Derbarish needs no introduction to even the lesser lights in boxing fandom, as that chap has walked rings around many would-be top notchers during the past year. He has been selected to meet what Mr. Goldberg honestly believes to be a boxer with the inherent talent of a champion, as Trambutus has forged to the front by taking the scalps of several of the best who have been before audiences at smokers in Portland and other cities. He cannot be considered an unknown quantity while at the same time the boy has yet to do his best and for this reason Derbarish has been placed against him. It is not often that Salem fans are favored with a chance to witness the "coming-out" of a real boxer, and this bout will amount to just that to a great degree.

The well known boxer, Abe Gordon, will also be on the program. He is another fighter who needs no introduction to the Salem sportsman.

Kid Hartford is scheduled to meet Gordon. Hartford is accustomed to speeding fight along side of the favorites. He is, in fact, a hard man to negotiate successfully unless the boxer who takes the chance has action to bolster up his reputation, and the number promises to breed some fine sport and excitement.

The three teams will face each other for at least six rounds, and Director Goldberg guarantees that each bout will arouse more than ordinary interest. The promoter of this smoker, managed a similar affair here last fair week with nice success and the entertainment next Monday will be no exception to the rule. In the absence of other sports in Salem this winter, the coming events are looked forward to with interest and in the event this one proves successful, this city will be made a regular meeting place for the most popular boxers in the future.
