Woodrow Wilson Shows Unexpected Strength In Straw Election

In a straw vote which was taken among the men who passed the Ladd & Bush bank between 4 and 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon Woodrow Wilson secured a total of 40 votes out of 84 for president of United States. The others stood, 22 for Hughes, 14 for Roosevelt, four for Allen Benson, a socialist, and one each for Burton, Fairbanks, Root and Robert La Follette.

The vote was taken on a wager made by W. A. Liston, a strong democrat, who was willing to back his opinions with cash. Mr. Liston expressed the belief that half of the people were favorable to Wilson and a vote was taken to settle the question. Mr. Liston gave huge odds when he took Wilson against the entire field and bet that Wilson would beat all of the others but the vote taken showed that his opinions were nearly correct at that. As bets were passed out at the corner and wagers, many of whom were farmers, cast their ballots for an hour.

Wallace R. Struble, secretary of the Naval Base committee, will tell the members of the commercial club Tuesday evening, what is being done to wards securing the establishment of a naval base at the mouth of the Columbia river. Eugene has already given \$500 towards the expense of keeping up a proper publicity campaign, and Salem will be asked for \$400, Portland \$3,000 and Astoria \$1,000. A bill has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman Hawley and by Senator Lane in the senate for an appropriation of \$5,000,000 for the preliminary surveys and purchase of a site. Should a naval base be established at the mouth of the Columbia, it would mean the probable expenditure of \$15,000,000 and a yearly payroll of \$2,000,000. All these matters will be given in to detail by Mr. Struble tomorrow evening at the commercial club.
