Von Igel Regarded by Officials As Guilty

Washington, April 25.—The basis of Attorney General Gregory's recommendation that Von Igel be held was understood to be that offenses attributed to Von Igel were committed before he became attached to the German embassy. Officials are more than ever opposed to his release. He is regarded as absolutely guilty.

If the papers taken from him are returned to the department of justice, the prosecution will be crippled and probably stopped for lack of evidence. The situation remains the same, except that the department of justice wants to keep the papers. The state department has announced that it will have German Ambassador Von Bernstorff select those he wants. The basis of the rumors that the documents contained Japanese propaganda is said to have been the statement of Von Igel's office mate that certain newspaper articles about Japan, for German circulation, should not be taken seriously.

Goes to Atlanta To Testify In Innes Case

Portland, Or., April 26.—Harry Davis, an official of the freight department of the Southern Pacific, was subpoenaed yesterday to go to Atlanta, Ga., to testify for the prosecution against Mr. and Mrs. Victor E. Innes. The Inneses are accused of making away with the property of Mrs. Eloise Nelms Dennis.

The mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Dennis and her sister, Miss Rebecca Nelms, both members of a prominent Atlanta family, excited attention here about two years ago. They are believed to be dead. Mr. and Mrs. Innes were arrested at Eugene, Or., and taken to San Antonio, Texas, where the sisters were last seen. An information charging murder was filed against them, but the grand jury returned a not true bill. The "corpus delicti," or proof of death, was lacking. Davis will testify about a shipment of freight for the Inneses which he handled when they came to Oregon after leaving San Antonio.
