In accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Commercial street between the north line of Mission street and the south city limits, adopted by the Common Council on the 1st day of May, 1916, and now on file in the office of the City Recorder, which for greater certainty and convenience are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice; being that character or kind of improvement known and designated in the said plans and specifications and estimates as No. 7, a redressed Macadam base, and a 2-inch wearing surface.

FRUIT NOT INJURED
Moomouth, Ore., May 15.—Now that the effect of the storm, and especially of the heavy frost of the middle of the week, is observed, it is found the damage in the immediate vicinity of Moomouth is very small. Prunes, the big crop, were not hurt. Cherry trees were damaged on sides exposed but there will be all the fruit the trees can develop. Pears were not hurt. Walnuts were damaged, but there will be a fair crop. Apples and small fruits did not suffer.

San Domingo, May 15.—Rebels having retired from the capital under threat of American intervention, congress is today preparing to elect a successor to President Jiminis, who resigned during the revolt. Police control the city, which is quiet.

SILVERTON COUNCIL CANCELS THE VOTE

A regular adjourned meeting of the city council was held Friday evening to canvass the vote of the general city election. P. W. Potter for mayor, G. T. Barr, N. Duggan and R. C. Allen for councilmen, Mark Paulson for recorder, P. K. Walker for treasurer, were declared duly elected.

Mark Paulson the newly elected city recorder, while only recently taking up his permanent residence here has claimed Silverton as his home for the past four years. While he registered at one time in Portland he never cast a vote there, and further than that cancelled his registration in Portland and re-registered here. Mr. Paulson being an attorney will make a valuable man in this position.

A petition to build an extension on the Russell building was placed with the street committee.—Silverton Appeal.

Mrs. Ludwig Dead
Mrs. Lovina Ludwig died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. L. Hughes, May 10th, 1916, at the age of 76 years, 5 months and 13 days.

She was born in Putnam county, Indiana, November 21, 1839. On July 14, 1859 she was married to Francis Ludwig, at West Port, Missouri. Eight children were born to them, four of whom died in infancy. About 25 years ago they moved to Dallas, and since that time this city has been her home. Mr. Ludwig died July 9, 1912, and since then she has lived a good share of the time with her children who reside in Dallas.

Mrs. Ludwig leaves to mourn her departure, four daughters, Mrs. C. A. Rice and Mrs. W. L. Hughes, of Dallas; Mrs. Anna L. Wood, of Portland, and Mrs. W. J. Martin, of Kinsman, Ohio. Besides these she leaves a sister in Charleston, Ill., eleven grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Funeral services were held at the United Evangelical church Wednesday and interment was in the L. O. O. P. cemetery.

Shortly before her death, Mrs. Ludwig composed a poem and dedicated it to her. This poem is printed in another column in this paper.—Polk County Times.
