Notice of Improvement of South Church Street
Notice is hereby given that the common council deem it expedient so to do, and hereby declare its purpose and intention to improve South Church street from the south line of State street to the north line of Mission street, except that portion there occupied by what is commonly known as the Bush or Church street bridge extending from the north line of Oak street to the north line of the westerly extension of Bellevue street, at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property by bringing said portion of South Church street to the official grade, constructing cement concrete curbs and paving said portion of said street with a six-inch, two-course bituminous concrete pavement, consisting of a one and one-half inch bituminous concrete wearing surface laid on a four and one-half inch bituminous concrete base in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said portion of South Church street, adopted by the common council on the 5th day of June, 1916, now on file in the office of the city recorder which for a more detailed description thereof are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice; being that character of kind of improvement known and designated in said plans, specifications and estimates as "Bituminous Concrete Pavement No. 5."

The common council hereby declares its purpose and intention to make said above described improvement by and through the Street Improvement Department of the city.

SUPREME COURT RULES ON SAFETY APPLIANCE LAWS
Washington, June 12.—The supreme court today decided the federal safety appliance regulations relating to steam railroads operating in interstate commerce in affirming a verdict of \$7,500 in favor of Edgar E. Campbell, injured motorman of the Spokane and Inland railroad company, who figured in a collision between Spokane, Wash., and Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, in which 18 persons were killed.
