

The United States department of labor, bureau of immigration, is sending out word that Kansas wants about 40,000 laborers to assist in harvesting the big wheat crop. Ordinary hands are offered from \$2 to \$3 a day, stockers \$3.50 to \$7 a day, engine men \$3.50 to \$7 a day. The harvest is now on, but the only discouraging thing about all this good news is that every man must pay his own transportation. All the government does is to notify labor where it is needed.

By order of the district court of the United States at Portland, the stock of the Chicago store will be sold to the highest bidder. Bids will be received until noon of Saturday, July 1 at the office of the receiver, R. L. Sablin, at his office in the Morgan building, Portland. The stock invoiced \$16,888.39 and fixtures, \$682.25. A certified check amounting to 10 per cent of the bid must accompany each bid and the sale will be subject to the approval of the U. S. court. An inventory of the stock may be seen at the Chicago store.
