

AUTOMOBILE SALES BREAK ALL RECORDS

Increase of More Than 500,000 Recorded in Last Year; Industry Is Tremendous

Donald McLeod Lay states in an article in the Automobile, that there are now in the United States 3,000,000 automobiles and 508,977 more cars in use today than on January 1 of this year, while the exports since that time have been 43,265. Iowa has a motor vehicle now for each 13 people, California one to each 15 people and Nebraska one to each 16, while New York has as many as 39 inhabitants to every car. A striking feature brought out by a comparison of the registration statistics of July 1 and those recorded at the first of the year is the stability and normal progress of the automobile industry. The average increase in registration in the United States for the entire year of 1915 was 39.6 per cent; for six months of 1916 the average is 21 per cent, or approximately 40 per cent on a yearly basis, since the registration tapers off to some extent during the last six months of the year.
