ARMY PURCHASES LARGE Washington, March 20.—Army purchases from July 1, 1918, to December 31 were made in the various sections of the country in the following proportions, the war department stated today: New England States, 13.5 per cent of the total purchases; middle Atlantic states, 26; southern state, eastern section, 6.4; southern states, western section, 1.4; central states, eastern section, 36.3; central states, western section, 6.8; western states, 9.

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FOUND NOT GUILTY

Portland, Or., March 20.—A jury in the circuit court last night found N. P. Sorensen, not guilty of involuntary manslaughter.

Sorensen, a well known lumberman, was accused of running over and killing Mrs. Mina Smith with his automobile here December 20.

The state contended the defendant caused the woman's death but didn't know it. There was no eye witness to the fatal accident.

SHIPPING COMPANY FORMED. Portland, Or., March 20.—The Columbia Shipping company was formed here with an initial capital of \$100,000. The incorporators are leading local business and professional men who hope to put the port in Portland. The company will immediately engage in coastwise and overseas transportation. It will take over the surrendered contract of Sudden & Christiansen, who had contemplated the operation of emergency fleet vessels out of Portland, and will ask the United States shipping board for a contract permitting charter of government vessels in a similar manner.

MAKE AID TESTS. London, Mar. 20.—The British air ministry announced that the steamer Montclair will start across the Atlantic today to make daily air tests with kites, the results of which will be made available to all aviators attempting a trans-Atlantic flight, regardless of nationality. Official announcement also was made that a government flying boat has been shipped to New Foundland, from where it will start across the Atlantic.
