Will Rogers Throws His Lariat Without a Word



Court House Notes

An order has been issued by Judge George G. Bingham restraining the defendant in the case of Edith Eyre White versus Dr. B. H. White from removing the two minor children from the jurisdiction of the court during the pending of the present divorce case or until further orders. The restraining order was issued on reasonable grounds, according to the Deerees.

In the case of Charles Maxwell versus Marshall L. Waring regarding a dispute in the boundary of a five-acre tract. The court decreed that the fence was set 30 feet over on the Maxwell land and that it should be set back to conform to the old fence of June 3, 1913.

The plaintiff is entitled to have three commissioners, one of which is to be a surveyor, to correct the boundary line between the two tracts.

In the matter of the estate of M. I. Hensel, the administrator, Roy F. Shields, was ordered by the court to transfer to Esther Snyder and John R. Hensel a certain note and mortgage executed by J. H. Lauterhan February 16, 1911.

American was to do, it was decided to accept no foreign orders.

That the ban on foreign contracts will be lifted with the ratification of the peace treaty is accepted as certain by officials here.

In advocating the revised construction program—which has resulted in widespread protest by shipbuilders in both western and eastern yards, Chairman Hurley is actuated by two considerations, he says:

First, he feels that we should not continue building ships at high war costs under peace conditions with money appropriated for war emergency purposes, especially where such ships were not to be delivered until 1920.

Second, he says, "many of the contracts cancelled were for ships of a size and type not commercially and economically advantageous in time of peace."

Hurley has ordered a complete survey of the shipping needs—both freight and passenger—on all the trade routes, and this report, expected within the next few days, will have an important bearing on changes he will recommend in the construction program.

To take the place of contracts now being cancelled, Hurley plans to let new contracts later for "larger and faster ships." Under the readjustment program, he says, no such yards will be left idle and no employees will be left suddenly without jobs.

Meantime, he has moved, he says, to end immediately delays in adjustment of shipbuilders' claims growing out of cancelled contracts.

Hurley is anxious to complete his work of reorganization, get his recommendations before congress and clean up the loose ends of his work so that he may retire from his present post and resume his private affairs.

Substitute Contracts Planned. San Francisco, May 5.—(United Press).—Telegrams from California organizations and attorneys are being sent to the shipping board, protesting the wholesale cancellation contract on the ground that it would leave 75,000 men unemployed in the state within two weeks, brought the following answer from

Chairman Hurley today:

"I fear my statements have been misinterpreted. We are revising our program to make a report to congress on the status of our shipbuilding program, together with a statement of types needed for a well balanced merchant marine. In the report that the board makes to congress in connection with any cancellation, we will recommend substitution of the contract for a type of vessel that is required."

Civic organizations, labor unions, etc., are working with the California committee on shipbuilding to prevent contract cancellations.

Immunity of peace negotiations with the Austrians naturally has resulted in bringing the Italian situation to the fore again. With the possible exception of Serbia, Italy will be affected to a greater extent by the terms of the Austrian pact than other of the allied nations.

A news agency circulated a report yesterday that the "big three" had invited the Italians to return to the conference. Owing to the nature of the alleged invitation, the report said, it is believed the Italians will accept.

No confirmation of this report could be obtained from any authoritative source.

A Rome dispatch to the Agency Radio declared the Italian cabinet yesterday sent a lengthy note to the allied governments. The nature of this message was not revealed, but it was assumed to be connected with the reported negotiations between the allied and Italian governments which appar-

ently have been under way since steps were taken for opening negotiations with Austria.

Apparently the only thing standing in the way of the Italian return is the discovery of a formula which will save Premier Orlando's face with the Italian people and at the same time leave President Wilson and the conference generally in an unaltered position. No backdown on Piume is intended by the allies, it is believed in reliable circles, and while there is no intention at present to actually "invite" the Italians to come to Paris, some way will be found to enable them to rejoin the conference.

Italian officials here express the conviction that their delegation will return, but declared Wilson's position on Piume tends to hinder them.

Consummation of peace with Bulgaria and Turkey, it is believed, will be undertaken practically at the same time as the settlement with Austria. The United States will not be directly concerned in either of these treaties, as it was not at war with these two countries.


