He leaves his wife and seven children 5 sons and 2 daughters and many other relatives to mourn his loss.

Some twelve years ago he professed religion and united with the Liberty Missionary Baptist church and remained a consistent member up to his death.

His remains were laid to rest in the cemetery of the Liberty church on July 26.
