Bound Over to the Criminal and Law Court

Earnest Bardill, a quiet farmer of the Lone Mountain community of planters, was arrested and brought to town and tried at the Court house in Wartburg on Monday of this week, before Bruno Schubert, a Justice of the Peace, the indictment charging Bardill with forgery.

The proof showed that a check was drawn on the Oakdale Bank & Trust Co, by Riley Jestes to Enoch Bardill and by Enoch Bardill endorsed.

The check was dated Oct. 8th, 1916, and was paid by said bank on Oct. 12th, 1916, the check being for \$10.00.

The warrant was sworn out by Riley Jestes who denied writing the check; and charging said Bardill with forging his name and getting the money on it.

Since a Justice of the Peace tries such cases on the probable cause of guilt and not upon the reasonable doubt, the defendant was bound over to court, in \$1000 bonds which he made and returned to his home that evening.

OBITUARY

On October the 17th, 1916, while still evening came creeping down upon the home of Mr Wm Howard of Rockwood, Tenn., the pallid messenger of death decended and claimed for its victim this beloved man.

Mr Howard was born in Morgan County on the 16th day of May, 1831, where he spent the greater part of his life. He was married to Miss Sarah Williams in 1858 and to this union there was born seven children five of whom are still living.

At the outbreak of the Civil War, Mr Howard joined the Union army and served it loyally, distinguishing himself in many battles.

He early affiliated himself with the Baptist Church and the Masonic fraternity, and lived the life of a christian. In his death the church and fraternity loose a brother of inestimable value.

It was characteristic of Mr Howard, both in his social life and business life, to foster every movement beneficial to the public and denounce with all his heart those things which he thought detrimental to himself and fellowman.

His life was not a life of great notoriety yet it was a life of wonderful usefulness. It is a life that should be taken as an example by all the young men.

He leaves to mourn his loss a widow: Mrs Howard, Rockwood, three daughters, Mrs T C Dillon, Petros, Mrs Wilburn Stowers, Rockwood, Mrs Gusty Howard, Sunbright; two sons, Messrs Andrew and Perry Howard, Crab Orchard.

Interment was made in the Lavender Cemetery near Deer Lodge, where without display, without pomp, without a gifted orator to give expression to lofty themes, the people with sincerity of simple love paid touching tribute to a fallen friend.

How fitting it is that he should be laid to rest amid the home folks of yore, where all who come hereafter may leave a posy at the tomb of one who cheered us a little nearer to that house not built with human hands, Eternal in the Heavens.
