## HISTORY

OF

### Morgan County

From its Formation down to  
the present day

(Continued from Last Week.

The women folks of the times  
had to bear part of the hardships  
for most all of the wearing apparel  
was woven in their own looms by  
themselves and often in the late  
hours of the night could be heard  
the thud, thud of the loom hand  
bar and the rattle of the shuttle,  
until the tired and sleepy mother  
and housewife when her eyelids  
tired out with her weared body  
would seek a short repose  
Such Americanism though un-

applauded in our day, though for-  
gotten in the rush and hurry of the  
busy times of this age of modern  
conveniences is unexcelled by any  
gaudy sensationalist who plays  
the heroine for notoriety rather  
than for love of country. Often-  
times these women folks after a  
part of the night of toil at the  
loom, distaff or flax-brake would  
go through cold or chilly weather  
for a distance of several miles and  
carry corn to mill or travel the  
distance to some trading place to  
buy with a meagre sum of money  
salt or sugar or coffee, or on being  
unable to purchase salt sometimes  
the dirt in the smoke house would  
be dug up and the salt boiled out  
of it.

During the civil war most every  
available man was in service, and  
consequently were conscripted by  
necessity, or if they remained at  
home they would be in hiding  
or the first force of confederates  
passing through would conscript  
them

Isham G Harris, the confederate  
war governor of Tennessee, had  
issued orders for the drafting of all  
men between the ages of sixteen  
and sixty and the confederates  
were carrying out the orders when-  
ever and wherever they could, and  
for this order Harris was called  
among East Tennesseans "King  
Harris," and we suppose partly  
from the records made by him dur-  
ing the war instead of this govern-  
ment giving him the same treat-  
ment England dealt out to Sir  
Roger Casement, Tennessee kept  
him in office almost the remainder  
of his lifetime; and most all of like  
record with him in all Southern  
States have been similarly honored,  
and yet it is interesting to notice  
how loud they could holler "Car-  
pet bagger" but we are glad that  
the cry has become obsolete, and  
proud of the fact that we live in  
a country that has been so lenient  
and merciful with their one time  
enemies. Some of the same blood  
are in our halls of congress now  
and apparently can look through a  
brick wall and recognize disloyal-  
ty; but that is all right. The times  
demand that all Loyal Americans  
should be "wise as serpents" if not  
as "harmless as doves."
