 —Hutchison & French do the Stationary Business of Kimball and are prepared for it.
 —The new safe for the Henry Bank arrived last Monday, and by next week the bank will be ready for business.
 —Miss Mary E. Ball, who went to her former home in Wisconsin to spend the winter, is once more at home in Kimball.
 —Bert Smith from Independence, Iowa, is here to stay this summer with his brother Frank, and will help him in his hardware store.
 —We acknowledge a friendly call from Mr. J. Keely of Manchester, Ia., who passed through here yesterday en-route to Deadwood with a large drove of fine young stock.
 —Our space for news has been made uncomfortable small this week on account of so many land notices, but we'll make more room after this if we have to double our paper in size again.
 —The post-office ruling that prevented the forwarding of postal cards and papers has been revoked, and such matter will hereafter be forwarded according to directions by the person addressed.
 —A new post office called Plainfield has been established at C. M. Gregory's about six miles east of this place. For the present, trains do not stop there, but merely run slow to take on and put off mail.
 —Look out for the big "add" of James D. Farrell next week. We will try to make room for it by that time. In the mean time call and examine his large and well selected stock of wagons, buggies, and all kinds of first class farming machinery.
 —Read the new card of Arch. H. Stuart. Soldiers or Sailors having claims before the pension department will find it to their advantage to call on him. He will also deal in real estate, lone money, locate parties on Government land and attend to claims before the U. S. Land Office.

 —Small grain looks fine. There is plenty of rain and the prospect for crops are encouraging.

 —Since March there has been an average of 150 cars of emigrants per day over the Iowa & Dakota division of the Milwaukee & St. Paul road, two-thirds of whom have gone into Dakota. In addition to this the daily passenger trains west have averaged 300 passengers, most of them seeking Dakota lands.

—A goodly number of shade, fruit and ornamental trees have been set out in town the past week. Let the good work continue, every tree planted adds to the looks and value of your property and aside from decorating your home, you are investing money that will repay you one hundred fold.
 —Brush Creek (Ioa.) News—We are well pleased with Dakota, and especially so with Yorktown and Kimball. From Canton to Mitchell the lands are too flat to suit our idea, but west of Mitchell the prairie is high and rolling, similar to the land just east of Taylorville. The soil is a rich black loam, varying in depth from one to two feet, with a subsoil of clay and sand. Claims in the vicinity of Plankinton, Yorktown and Kimball are selling at \$500 to \$1,000 each.

Stewart from Dubuque, Ioa. of whom we made mention some time ago as locating a colony in the southern part of the county has arrived in town again, and this time with his family to stay with us. We gladly welcome him and hope he may like Kimball and its surroundings. Below is what the Dubuque Herald says of him on his departure from that city. "Capt. Archie H. Stewart and family left the city last evening for Kimball, D. T. which place will be their future home. For a quarter of a century Capt. Stewart has resided in Dubuque and has been identified with its best interests in many useful and honorable connections. While regretting their departure, our citizens will wish Mr. Stewart and his family success and prosperity in their new home and congratulate the people of Kimball upon the acquisition they will prove to their community."

To School Clerks.
 Ther appears to be a lack of clearness in the school law, for those who read it the first time, as to the first or organizing election in school townships.
 Section 30 declares the officers, the regular term for which they shall be chosen and how the first or fractional term shall be organized.
 Section 31 provides for the regular annual election in school townships that are duly organized but does not provide for the organizing election.
 Section 32 provides for the first or organizing election and that only. It gives two methods; one for civil townships to become school townships, and the other, beginning in line 7, for the first election where there are no civil townships beforehand. In these cases the county board will fix the date for elections and the polling places and appoint the election officers. The county Clerk and Sheriff make and serve the notices. By reading closely, all the remaining duties will appear.
