Not only are the luxuriant natural grasses of this territory highly relished by the cattle and admirably adapted to the production of first class butter, but the cost of the feed here is not over a quarter of what it is in the eastern states. The young man is quite well again, and a scar is hardly noticeable. The operation must have been a hard one to the patient, but reflects great credit to the attending physician.
