Rev. Mr. Warren in Trouble. Sioux Falls, S. D., Aug. 25.—Rev. W. H. Jordan, presiding elder of the Sioux Falls district, has just returned from Alexandria, where by direction of Bishop Fowles, he presided at the trial of Rev. C. B. Warren, pastor of the Methodist church of Alexandria on the charge of lying, preferred by members of his church. There were three specifications in which Mr. Warren was charged with having represented that he expected a remittance from a missionary fund and by such representations to have secured credit and allayed the anxiety of creditors. A committee of five ministers formed the committee which heard the evidence. Rev. Wood of Scotland appeared for the defense and Rev. L. Bradford of Mitchell for the prosecuting church members. The committee found Mr. Warren guilty as charged in two specifications and he was suspended until the meeting of the next conference. The committee in its report stated that there were extenuating circumstances which greatly mitigated the enormity of the offense.
