THE VALLEYS OF OREGON.

Above Which Angels Fold Their Wings and Reek A Land Flowing With Milk and Honey.

The National Editorial association, on its travels, has an opportunity of seeing more of the towns passed through in one day than the ordinary tourist would see in five.

The railroad companies appreciate this fact also, and while in Oregon their representatives are very anxious to haul our north to Salt Lake City and then south to Yellowstone Park.

In making up one of these special trains for the use of the National association, the secretary, who has whole charge of the matter, assigns one, two, three or more states to each car, depending upon the number of delegates and their ladies from a state.

As indicated, the railroad companies haul the National special largely to please the crowd and without reference to any prearranged schedule.

We left this city early Sunday morning, July 9, for the trip down the beautiful valleys of Oregon, of which I wrote last week. The special was made up of two sections, with two locomotives to each section, going out of Portland over the heavy grade of the Southern Pacific.

The locomotives on this line all burn wood and frequent stops are necessary to "wood up." Sometimes a locomotive would cut up in a twenty-mile run, all the fuel the tender would hold, piled way up above the cab.

The first stop was at Hillsboro, a pretty little town, and where a large concourse of people awaited our arrival, even though the stop was to be five minutes only, and the ladies of which brought great quantities of beautiful flowers and passed them into the cars.

A similar reception, only on a larger scale, awaited us at McMinnville, county seat of Yamhill county, which county is very rich in resources and has a population of 16,000.

Incidentally every city or town in Oregon upward of 2,000 population can be depended upon to have a waterworks system and an electric light plant. It is so in Colorado and in fact all over the far west.

bany is one of the leading towns of western Oregon and has a population of 4,000 or 5,000. It is the county seat of Linn county, the crack agricultural county of the state, lying in the heart of the Willamette valley.

I think in a former letter I referred to the rainfall of this valley, which varies from 20 to 40 inches annually, depending upon elevation, and which comes almost wholly in November, December, January and February, varying a month either way in different seasons.

As the sun was setting we steamed into Roseburg. We didn't like this town a little bit, being dusty, dirty and miserably laid out, up hill and down and around the corner to nowhere.

When we awoke next morning we found our train in the yards at Ashland, lovely Ashland, 311 miles south of Portland. Here the citizens of this enterprising city had prepared one of the finest receptions we met anywhere.
