The Creamery Manager.

The following paper was read before the Washington state dairy convention. There is a great deal of it bearing upon the patron, stockholder, and the manager.

"I think in a sense the manager should stand to the patron as the schoolmaster to his scholar, meriting their confidence and instructing them in all the methods of advancement along dairy lines. He can be a missionary for good and up-building, or a devil of destruction and discouragement."

"The manager must depend on the patron for the supply of milk necessary to keep running. This patronage he must merit by a deserved reputation for prompt, just and exact business methods, personal integrity and square dealing."

"It is of especial importance that the manager pursue strictly business methods, not however, having any set or iron rules which cannot be accommodated to particular circumstances; but in the main his methods should be strictly business, which will teach the patron what to expect, and what he can depend upon, so that he can at all times rely upon promises, and the day of payment and make calculations accordingly."

"All large business enterprises are monuments to the integrity and ability of some one man, and a large business cannot be built up with cheating, wrong and fraud as a foundation. This self-evident fact stands in the hands of both patron and manager to remember."

"One thing which especially behooves the creameryman is to insist on the patron being cleanly and careful in milking and to set the milk where it will not absorb the many foul odors so common around the stable. Milk returned a few times at a loss to a patron will cause him to be more particular in this respect or cause him to change creameries, but the manager had better lose this patron than work an injustice on all his painstaking patrons by inoculating their milk with countless millions of foul bacteria."

"It is human nature to view with suspicion what we do not understand, and it is for this reason, perhaps more than any other, that so many patrons through out all creamery districts are not satisfied with payments based on the test. I think it the part of the sensible manager to try and banish these suspicions and induce the patrons to come in on test day and see exactly how it is done, or if they will not do that, have a convenient tester for loaning purposes, with instructions as to how to use it, and let them test to their own satisfaction, when suspicion will vanish before the manifest justice of this method. I say that a manager should necessarily be a patient man, always remembering there are those who have not mastered the details of his business like himself and to whom explanations are due. All of us might emulate that noble example of patience, who, with that perfect simplicity, has probably answered the same question a thousand times and who has devoted a lifetime of infinite toil to upbuilding of that industry in which we might style ourselves novices by comparison. That man whom we all know either personally or through his work, is none other than W. D. Hoard of Wisconsin."

"Were I asked what I would consider the one most necessary quality of a successful creameryman I should say, first and foremost he should be a capable business man; but there are many qualities besides that necessary. His business ability will be related not only with the affairs of his business, but he will be called upon to look into the affairs of many of his patrons, and with a quick comprehension advise and assist them safely through their difficulties. A successful manager should also possess a knowledge of machinery and of the mechanical principles applied in the various branches of manufacture. He should either be a buttermaker himself, or a good judge of points and he should also thoroughly understand the Babcock test, as also the acid test to determine the acidity of cream. Another important quality not to be omitted in the manager is that he should be a capable accountant, one who can readily explain any little confusion which may arise in an account."

"It is the proud boast of any manager when he can say: 'I can fill the position of any man in my employ.' Such a man is master of his business, and bound to succeed, and one in whom the patron is willing to trust his interests."
