

LET'S HUSBAND GO TO JAIL TO FOIL HIS FIRST WIFE

Only Way Artist Perry Can Get Out of Paying Alimony, She Realizes.

With the full consent of his wife—who is Mrs. Perry No. 2—Roland Hinton Perry, the artist and sculptor, is going to immolate himself in Ludlow Street Jail, so to speak, in order to satisfy a judgment held by his first wife for \$1,100 back alimony. Mr. Perry expects to take up his residence in the Maison de Ludlow to-morrow morning.

A six months' term in the not-uncomfortable jail will purge him of contempt of court incurred by his failure to pay alimony. And after that he will be immune from arrest, the \$1,100 bill of arrears will be wiped out and he will start with a clean alimony slate.

Mrs. Perry lives at the Hotel Van Rensselaer, in West Eleventh street, with her two-month-old baby. She is naturally disturbed over the outlook, but is game to go the entire route. "I am in full accord," she said to-day, "with Mr. Perry's determination to go to jail and so wipe out his alimony indebtedness. Above everything else it is an injustice to compel him to pay alimony to his first wife. Why, when he is trying to do his full duty as a husband and father to me and my baby, should he be held by legal restrictions to a former wife who divorced him.

Arranging for His Absence. "Mr. Perry is an artist. In the present state of the market for works of art he is unable to gather \$1,100. Hence he must go to jail. He is out of the city to-day arranging for me to live comfortably during his incarceration and I expect that he will give himself up to-morrow morning.

Mrs. Perry has been married before. She was Mrs. Max Harry Fisher of San Diego, Cal., when Mr. Perry met and wooed her two and a half years ago. The first Mrs. Perry was Irma Hinton, the sculptor's first cousin. He married her in 1885. She was a daughter of Lucy Bronson Hinton, the sculptor, and a sister of Mrs. Harry Bronson and the former Mrs. James Hunker. A few years ago she collaborated with Richard Le Gallienne in writing "The Laureate of Gossip." Mrs. Irma Hinton Perry made her debut on the stage in

until last May, when the panic hit him. He hasn't paid anything since, and Mrs. Perry No. 1 became peevish. Declared in Contempt. Her attorney in January made a motion to have Perry punished for contempt. Mrs. Perry wanted a settlement on a basis of \$125 a month for arrears, her claim amounting to \$1,120. He offered to pay \$50 down and \$100 a month until he had settled the bill, which, he asserted, was only \$50. She declined. He was given a few weeks to settle, but, according to his lawyer, has been declared in contempt and expects to go to jail to-morrow.

When she was granted a divorce in 1894 Perry was ordered to pay her \$125 a month alimony. He said, "This is too much," and began to fall behind in the payments. After threatening him with punishment, Mrs. Perry No. 1 agreed in 1896 to accept \$50 a month. He paid this, according to his attorney,
