BAD DAY FOR DEFENSE IN CAMPBELL INQUIRY

Testimony Brought Out by
Witnesses for Petitioners.

ACQUITTAL PROMISED

Jurors Said to Have Promised
the Judge Verdict of Not Guilty

MAY CLOSE THEIR CASE TODAY

Very Probable That Petitioners Will
Rest This Afternoon, and an Ad-
journment Will Follow to Give
the Defense Time to Pre-
pare Their Side—No
Let Up in Interest.

With the reopening of the Campbell in-
vestigation yesterday before the Commit-
tee for Courts of Justice came a string
of sensations of such character as would
indicate that this subject, already much
behampered and belittled, is especially
fresh, and is inexhaustible in its
store of material of the explosive sort.

Predictions by the most expectant
could not have been better verified. Many
supposed that the gentlemen conducting
the case for the petitioners had about
run ground after what they succeeded
in stirring up last week, but as the
evidence shows the few who ventured still
to believe and to predict that before the
smoke of the first broadside cleared away
the flash of another would be seen, were
correct in their estimate of the situation.
In some of its features the first day
of the reopening forced far ahead of any-
thing that has yet come to pass. Up to
this day nothing had created the sensation
which followed the words of one of the
witnesses, when he detailed the con-
versation he had overheard in the room
where an open window in the room where
the jury trying Judge Clarence J. Camp-
bell for assault upon the Rev. C. H.
Crawford sat deliberating upon the ver-
dict.

Other things besides this went to dis-
tinguish the day as one of paramount
interest and importance. One of the dis-
tinct features was the significant state-
ment from Major General Conrad as to his
belief in reference to the evidence sub-
mitted by the prosecution; another was
the development of the fact that the
prosecution is about through with its
case, and will make no further effort to
bring up to the evidence which the com-
mittee would like to go in for the de-
fense right away Monday, and that Judge
Campbell will probably demand a recess
during which he can prepare his case.
All these things, and besides are what
made yesterday the day of chief im-
portance in the Campbell inquiry up
to this time.

The Hearing Yesterday.

So far as the testimony is concerned,
the first day of the second session of the
committee was all that could be
asked from the point of view of a public
on the keen edge for sensations of any
sort, size, or description. From the
morning hours the committee met in a
degraded hall, and the hearing went
against the defense, and the effects
of the strain were apparent in the
faces of some, including Judge Camp-
bell.

At the morning session there were three
strong features which overshadowed all
else. First of all came the negro man-
former servant in the Campbell house-
hold who swore that about three years
ago, after the county had gone dry, and
it was unlawful to sell liquor in An-
napolis, he had been sent by Judge Camp-
bell to buy whiskey from S. A. Day.
The whiskey seller, whose name has
been figured so prominently in the in-
quiry. More astounding than all was
the statement of the negro that the day
upon which this happened was Sunday.
Next came the testimony of the witness
at which it was to be expected that in
the congressional campaign between Flood
and Loving in 1900, whiskey had been
used pretty freely on the Flood side—
whiskey bought by the direction of Judge
Campbell and distributed according to
his instructions.

But far from least, was the
startling statement of Mr. John T.
Bowen, an Amherst farmer—the sensa-
tion of the day and of the entire in-
vestigation for that matter. "On the last
night of the trial of Judge Campbell,"
said the witness, "was out on the court
green, and through an open window
heard the jury as they were in their
room trying to come to a verdict. I
heard them after Mr. Woodruff, who
wanted to bring in a verdict of acquittal
and they would rest upon their own
verdict which would be a disgrace to the
county. * * * I heard them tell Woodruff
that if they did not carry in a verdict
of not guilty, they would be lynched by
the crowd in the court room."

Such a statement was sufficient to
excite every one to a high expectancy,
and as might be supposed it created a
sensation. The other testimony was
scattering in its nature, and was as
nothing compared with it. In the after-
noon Mr. A. D. Beard was placed upon
the stand and he gave his side of the
recent differences between him and
the defendant. He declared among other
things that he was being persecuted by
Judge Campbell.

WAS GREAT VICTORY FOR WM. A. JONES

Led Opposition to Philippine
Coinage Bill.

MEASURE IS DEFEATED

It Had the Support of the Big
Republican Leaders.

THE RESULT WAS A SURPRISE

Substitute Offered by the Virginian
Adopted—His Democratic Associ-
ates Stood With Him and Twenty-
eight Members of Majority
Party Came Over to
His Side.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The House
leaders went down to signal defeat to-
day when the House by a vote of 136 to
123 rejected the Philippine coinage bill
reported by the Insular Affairs Commit-
tee, and adopted the substitute by the
minority, under the leadership of Mr.
Jones, of Virginia, for the identification
of American currency in the island.

The Insular Committee includes in its
membership the chairman of the most
powerful committees of the House, Mr.
Cannon, chairman of the Appropriations;
Mr. Hill, chairman of Foreign Affairs;
Mr. Payne, chairman of Ways and
Means; Mr. Hepburn, chairman of Inter-
state Commerce, and Mr. Tawney, chair-
man of the Committee of Exposition.
They reported a bill to establish the gold
standard in the islands, silver dollars at
their bullion value, and carried the sub-
stitute through. The fact that Secretary
Shaw and other high Treasury officials
were quoted on the floor as favoring the
substitute added to the overthrow of the
committee bill. The coinage were used
as against that of Governor Taft and
other members of the Philippine Com-
mission. The substitute provided that the
lawful money of the United States
shall be legal tender in the Philippines
and declares the coinage laws of the
United States to be in full force there.
It provides for the redemption of the
Mexican and Spanish silver dollars at
their bullion value. After six months no
coin except that of the United States
shall be legal tender. The bill provides
for coinage of Philippine silver.

The Alaska delegates' bill was taken up
and was supported by Mr. Cushman, Re-
publican, Washington; Mr. Wooten,
Democrat, Texas, and Mr. Sulzer, Demo-
crat, New York, and by Mr. Warner, Re-
publican, Illinois. The House adjourned
until to-morrow.

TALKED IN HIS SLEEP
AND GOT INTO TROUBLE

her display of anger. Morgan's defense
is that his wife's temper is unbearable.

THE POSTMASTERS
MUSN'T ENDORSE

President Roosevelt Will Send
Out a Circular to All
of Them.

(By Associated Press.)
MACON, GA., January 22.—Harry Still-
well Edwards, the postmaster of Macon,
returned to-day from Washington, where,
along with Colonel W. H. Johnson, United
States marshal for the Northern District
of Georgia, he had gone to consult with
the President with regard to the govern-
ment service in Georgia.

Mr. Edwards, in an interview with the
Macon Telegraph, says the President has
decided to issue a circular to all postmas-
ters, informing them that they will be de-
barred from appointment to office any
official who may for a valuable consid-
eration give to an applicant for office his
endorsement.
Mr. Edwards says he has the President's
permission to announce his policy in the
following language:
"The spirit of the Constitution forbids
that any man shall be refused office on
account of race or color; it also forbids
that any man shall be refused office on
account of race or color. The whole mat-
ter receives itself within the party, back
into a question of character, ability and
fitness, and of previous service, or the en-
dorsement of the community at interest.
I shall constitute the best test. Where a
suitable member of the party cannot be
found the best man obtainable will be
chosen."
Mr. Edwards says that he takes this
positive statement to the President to re-
fer particularly to localities where local
officials are to be appointed, and not
where officials' functions involve States
or Territories.

TWELVE WERE KILLED AND TWENTY INJURED

Deadly Effect of German
Guns Upon Fort.

WALLS BATTERED DOWN

An Eye-Witness Gives a Graphic
Account of the Affair.

VILLAGE SUFFERED DAMAGE

Many of the Shells Did Not Reach the
Fort, but Exploded in the Town.
None of the British or Italian
Warships Took Part in the
Bombardment of
San Carlos.

(By Associated Press.)
MARACAIBO, Jan. 22.—The bombard-
ment of Fort San Carlos by the German
cruisers Vineta, Panther and Falke was
continued yesterday afternoon until six
o'clock. It was resumed this morning at
daybreak. The first shells were hurled
at the fort at four o'clock at long range.
At six o'clock, the Panther, being of
light draught, closed in and became
actively engaged. The fort replied.

At eight o'clock the engagement was
proceeding as fiercely as yesterday.
Twelve dead and fifteen badly wounded
Venezuelan soldiers were counted in the
fort at seven o'clock last night by the
correspondent of the Associated Press.
This morning at daybreak seven or
eight shells were hurled at the fort at
four o'clock at long range. They all fell
short.

STORY OF THE FIRING.
The Panther left her position close in to
Fort San Carlos, which she took up
early in the day, Wednesday afternoon
at 3 o'clock, and joined the Falke. This
ship was half a mile outside the bar,
about five miles from the fort.
At 3 o'clock the correspondent of the
Associated Press in a rowboat approach-
ed one side of the fort, out of range, and
from this point witnessed the long-range
fire of the German cruisers, which was
continued from 3 o'clock until 6 o'clock.
The Vineta and the Falke were close
together and nearer the fort than the
Panther.

SCENE IN THE FORT.

At 7 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, the
correspondent, who was accompanied
by a government telegrapher, bearing a
telegram from President Castro, to the
commandant at San Carlos, landed on
the island and entered the fort. The
walls of the fort are terribly battered
and there were many evidences of the
fierce engagement.

Twelve dead Venezuelan soldiers were
counted behind the ramparts and fifteen
other men, seriously wounded, were ly-
ing on a low platform. The fort is liter-
ally covered with pieces of broken shells.
It was noted that a great many of the
German shells had not exploded. The
muzzle had a very narrow escape, two
shells having come within an ace of
penetrating it. The walls of the fort,
which face towards the entrance of the
lake, were particularly, and were
greatly damaged.

It is estimated by the commandant,
General Bello, that the German ships
fired more than 1,000 shells at Fort San
Carlos.

VILLAGE SUFFERED.

Although the damage inflicted upon
the fort by the returned fire of the Ger-
man cruisers is very great, it is not
all that could be expected from such a
continuous fire from modern high power
guns. The village of San Carlos suffered
greatly. The aim of the German gun-
ners appears to have been inaccurate, for
more than sixty per cent. of their shells
exploded in the village before reaching
the fort.

The cannon mounted at San Carlos have
not sufficient range to reach the
Falke and Vineta, so the fire of these
vessels was not returned as they kept out
of reach of the artillery of the fort.
The Falke and Vineta are of too great
draught to cross the bar. The Panther
alone can do this and this fact explains
why the last mentioned cruiser was the
only one to come in close to the fort.
