**COLD WAVE HALTS STREET CLEANING**

Water Freezes on Asphalt and Work Stops.

EARLY RAIN AIDS GREATLY

Assisted by Forces from Water Department, Laborers of Street-Cleaning Branch Clear the Downtown Thoroughfares of Ice and Snow. Use Ice Picks To-day.

Halted by the sudden drop in temperature which sent the mercury from its place in the fifties to the twenties, the ambitious laborers of the street-cleaning department to pull the streets to a passable condition by flushing received a setback last night. The laborers were dismissed about 5 o'clock, when the water began to freeze on the asphalt as soon as it left the hose, and rendered crossings dangerous for pedestrians.

The day was not without its results, however, for the section bounded by Fourteenth street, Pennsylvania avenue, Twentieth street, and Massachusetts avenue was cleaned of ice and snow. A warm rain in the early morning greatly aided the work, and at 8 o'clock added forces were drafted from the water department. But little attempt was made to dislodge the ice banks, these being left to the "white wing" forces.

Use Ice Picks To-day.

Just what branch of the work will be taken up this morning had not been decided upon by Supt. James Wood when he left the District Building yesterday. The impossibility of using the water method of cleaning will preclude any further operation of either the flushing or sweeping machines and ice picks and shovels probably will be used.

Referring to the statements of Supt. Wood that the street-cleaning fund was not sufficient to carry on the work at this time, some one was kind enough yesterday to point out to the Commissioners that at the time of the inaugural parade, the superintendent found it possible to clean a line of march eighty feet wide and two miles long, with ice and snow ten inches deep, at a total cost of \$62.25.

The informant, who did not give his name, added that the city would be willing to see that \$1,500 drop another \$55 right now if expedient results could be obtained. He also inquired what had become of the three gutter plows purchased by the street-cleaning department just previous to March 4, and also the seventeen bought just after inauguration. He declared that none had been seen on the streets, and that he was of the opinion they would be of use in dislodging ice at street corners.

**PLAN PUBLICITY FOR PROJECT**

Subcommittees of C. of C. to Make Reports Tuesday.

Means of Arousing Interest in George Washington Memorial Hall to be Discussed.

The George Washington Memorial Hall committee from the Chamber of Commerce will meet in the rooms of the Chamber on Tuesday evening next at the call of the chairman, Granville M. Hunt, to receive reports of subcommittees which have had details of plans under consideration for several days.

The subcommittee on publicity and education, of which O. P. Newman is chairman, has made a preliminary survey of the field with a view to arranging for a plan of action. A pamphlet setting forth the purposes and benefits of the memorial has been suggested for wide distribution. Extension of ideas among the citizens by means of school children and by a mass meeting of delegates from organizations, societies, churches, and similar bodies also have been considered as means of arousing citizens to a full realization of the great benefits that must accrue to the city from such a building.

The committee has displayed the greatest activity in its preparatory work and has prepared its plans in proportion to the magnitude of the undertaking. The work of the committee on the next night of meeting will be to prepare a tentative plan to submit to the Chamber of Commerce at an early date.

**GIRL DIES OF BURNS.**

Josephine Little Succumbs at Casualty Hospital.

A certificate of accidental death has been issued by Coroner Nevitt in the case of Josephine Little, twelve years old, who died at Casualty Hospital yesterday morning from burns received on December 17, when her clothing caught fire from a gas range in the kitchen of her home at 825 Fifth street northeast.

The child was preparing dinner for her mother, Mrs. Margaret Little, who is employed in a department store. Physicians feared the child would not survive her injuries, but after she had lived for several days, hope for her recovery was entertained. Her sudden death was a shock to the physicians and nurses at Casualty Hospital, as well as to relatives and friends of the girl's mother. Arrangements for the funeral have not been completed.

**McClellan Funeral To-day.**

Veteran Will be Laid at Rest in Arlington Cemetery.

James O. McClellan, a veteran of the civil war and a former employe of the Treasury Department, who died at Garfield Hospital Thursday morning, will be buried this afternoon in Arlington Cemetery. Funeral services will be held in Gawler's Chapel. He is survived by his wife, a son, James Sherman McClellan, of Chicago, and three daughters, Misses Julia and Eunice, of this city, and Miss Edith McClellan, of Minneapolis.

Mr. McClellan was born in Bristol, Ill., in 1840. He taught school when sixteen years old, and resigned to enter the University of Chicago. In 1862 he came to Washington and studied law at the Columbian University, now George Washington. Later he practiced law at Kane, Ill. He received an appointment in the Treasury Department and moved here with his family.

During the war, Mr. McClellan served as captain of the Sixty-ninth Illinois Volunteers. He was a member of Burnside Post, G. A. R., which organization will have charge of the funeral.

**BANK PRESIDENT INJURED.**

E. Quincy Smith Struck by Car in New York City.

E. Quincy Smith, president of the National City Bank and the Union Savings Bank, is confined to his home, 204 R street northwest, suffering from injuries sustained on Wednesday night, when he was struck by a car while walking at the Columbia University, now George Washington. Later he practiced law at Kane, Ill. He received an appointment in the Treasury Department and moved here with his family.

Mr. Smith feared he had received internal injuries, but an examination by physicians yesterday at his home disclosed that his only injuries are a sprain of the right arm, a bruise of the hip, bruise, and shock. Physicians believe he will be able to return to his office in a few days.
