CORNSTALK PAPER.

Experiments of Agricultural Department Successful.

The day of paper made from cornstalks has come, the experiments of the Department of Agriculture having proved the process can be made a commercial proposition. For some time these experiments have been under way, says the Progress Magazine, and now the department is utilizing some of the cornstalk paper for its correspondence, and operates a mill which turns out the new paper, of a high-grade, by the hundred pound lot.

Perhaps it will not be many years before the farmer will look upon his stalks as the most valuable part of his corn crop. If he can realize but half a cent a pound he will get more for them than for his corn at 60 cts. a bushel.

When congress re-assembles in January the entire constitution will probably be rejected and the act of annexation and statehood waived until a more suitable constitution is drafted.

In the first place, the constitutional convention which met in Santa Fe, over-stopped all sensible limits when it declared for a re-survey of the state line which separates New Mexico from Texas. The delegates not only decided to take part of Texas, but they also decided that Texas should concede El Paso county to Old Mexico, and thereby put an end to the border dispute.

Girl Held In St. Louis On Charge of Stealing.

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 29.—Lilly McDowell, in jail here on the charge of stealing \$6,000 worth of jewelry from H. Coteau Dyer, an attorney, while acting as a servant in his home, has \$12,000 on deposit in the Pittsburgh, Pa., Bank for Savings, according to information in Dyer's possession.

Local detectives are making country-wide inquiry to learn whether the girl has other bank accounts. The value of the jewelry she is accused of stealing from different homes in which she was employed is stated by the local police to be at least \$75,000.


