

COUNCIL HOLDS TWO INTERESTING SESSIONS

to the highest and best bidder a franchise to erect, maintain and operate a telephone exchange in said city for a period of twenty years from and after its acceptance.

The person or persons, company or corporation becoming the purchaser of said franchise when sold, after said sale shall have been confirmed by this council, shall have granted to him, them, or it, a franchise, giving him, them, or it, his, their or its successors, assigns or lessees, the following privileges, and imposing upon him, them, or it, his, their, or its successors, assigns or lessees, the following restrictions:

Sec. 1. That there is hereby created and established a franchise or privilege to erect, operate and maintain a telephone exchange, embracing central office, telephone poles, fixtures, cables and wires, along, through, over and under the streets, sidewalks and alleys of said city of Hopkinsville, Kentucky.

Sec. 2. The said franchise or privilege shall continue for a period of twenty years from and after the time the same shall take effect, and be subject to transfer or assignment.

Sec. 3. Said poles, fixtures, cables and wires shall be erected and maintained in a substantial and workmanlike manner; said poles shall be located so as not to interfere with the legitimate entrance of any adjacent property, nor to obstruct the free use of said streets, sidewalks and alleys for the purpose of public travel.

Sec. 4. The purchaser of said franchise or privilege, his successors or assigns shall properly replace any paving and macadam that may be disturbed by said purchaser in setting said poles, and shall also at said purchaser's own expense remove all dirt, and debris that may accumulate in making excavations for that purpose.

Sec. 5. The city of Hopkinsville, Kentucky, shall have the right to place, maintain and operate its fire and police alarm wires upon poles of said purchaser, within the corporate limits of said city, free of charge, provided said wires shall be located upon said poles in such a way as not to interfere with the wires of said purchaser.

Sec. 6. Said purchaser, his successors and assigns, shall indemnify said city from any and all damage that may arise from the presence of said poles, fixtures, cables and wires, upon, along or under said streets, sidewalks and alleys, or from its failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 7. If said purchaser, his successors, or assigns, shall fail to per-

form any one of the above named terms and conditions of this ordinance, said city of Hopkinsville, through and by its council, may, after giving said purchaser, his successors and assigns, reasonable notice of such failure, and such failure is not remedied, revoke all rights and privileges herein granted, and cause all poles, wires and apparatus erected under this ordinance to be removed. Nothing in this franchise shall be construed so as to give the purchaser, his successors or assigns, any exclusive right to the privilege granted in section No. 1.

Sec. 8. That the purchaser of this franchise, his successors, or assigns, shall not charge and collect for the rental of telephones in the city of Hopkinsville, Kentucky, exceeding the following rates.



Long distance lines per month each	\$3 50
Professional long distance lines per month each	3 00
Long distance business 2 party line, per month each	2 50
Professional long distance, 2 party lines, per month each	2 00
Joint use of telephone by two parties additional	.50

RESIDENCE.

Direct, long distance lines, per month each	\$2.00
Long distance 2 party lines, per month each	1.50

No more than two parties to be put on any line within a radius of 1 1/2 miles of the exchange at Hopkinsville, and said purchaser, its successors, or lessees, hereby agree to maintain the central energy of common battery system during the life of this franchise, or other services equally as good and agrees at all times to give to its patrons within said city an improved and up-to-date service during the life of its franchise within ten days after the approval and publication of this ordinance, it should be the duty of the said City-council through the clerk of the Board of council of the city of Hopkinsville, Kentucky, or by advertising same in some news paper of general circulation published in said city for a period of at least 20 days; that bids will be received at public outcry for the before mentioned franchise or privilege, of said clerk shall state in said advertisement the time and place, (Said place to be in front of city court room within said city of Hopkinsville, said sale to be on the 19th day of January, 1911, when said bids shall be received and said clerk shall according to such receive bids and reports same to said city council at a regular meeting of said council to be held on the 20th day of January 1911, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. and said city council shall award such franchise or privilege to the highest and best bidder, but said city council hereby reserves the right to reject any and all bids made at the sale of



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this franchise, and said advertisement shall resume the right to reject any and all bids.

The bidder to whom said franchise or privilege shall be awarded shall pay the amount of such bids in cash or by duly certified check to the treasurer of said city of Hopkinsville, Ky., within five days after said franchise is sold as herein provided; and it is further ordained that the minimum price for which this franchise shall be sold is an amount equal to the cost of advertising this ordinance and all ordinances in connection therewith, and said purchaser, its successors and assigns, shall during the life of this franchise, furnish telephone service free of rental, to the said city of Hopkinsville for the official business of the city, eleven telephones and one extension set, to be located in said city as the council may from time to time direct.

Each officer of said city having such telephones to be listed separately in telephone directory where more than one officer uses same telephone, and the service to be long distance single line, and equal to that furnished any citizen of Hopkinsville. So long as it remains the policy of the purchaser in Kentucky to give free county service, the same will be accorded to its Hopkinsville patrons.

Another ordinance was passed prohibiting the use of slot machines in the city until they have been inspected and a permit obtained from the Mayor. The penalty is a fine of \$10 a day.

AGED CITIZEN.

Tobacco News.

The new year starts out with the long looked for tobacco season and Hopkinsville will experience the busiest January in its history.

Much of the crop has been sold privately at prices ranging from \$8 to \$11.25 round and this will result in bringing to market several million pounds of tobacco as soon as it can be handled. In addition to this wholesale movement, the three loose floors will soon be overrun with business from the territory within a radius of 50 miles.

It is estimated that 30,000,000 pounds of tobacco was sold here during 1910, and 1911 is expected to exceed all records.

As a tobacco market Hopkinsville has no successful rival in the Dark District. Hopkinsville occupies the unique position of having maintained the market without serious interruption throughout the tobacco war and much territory was opened up to the city dealers while other markets were inactive.

Practically all of the old territory is again patronizing the market, the planters showing a delayed appreciation of the blessings Hopkinsville conferred upon them by maintaining a permanent market for their products. Not only is the crop this season better and larger but the prices are higher and the demand stronger.

The outlook is indeed bright.
