MAYFIELD VICTOR.

Local Sunday School Was Badly Defeated.

The Sunday school contest between the Ninth Street Christian church and the Mayfield Christian church ended last Sunday. More than 800 were present at the Mayfield school and 460 at the school here. The offering at Mayfield amounted to \$32, the offering here to \$120. SMALLPOX IS NORTH OF TOWN

Five Cases Reported From Crofton and Red Hill District.

REV. THOMAS HAS IT.

Health Officer Lackey is Vigorously Investigating All Cases.

Several cases of smallpox have been reported from the northern part of the county and Dr. W. A. Lackey, county Health Officer, is taking vigorous steps to stop a possible spread of the disease.

There are four cases in the family of Rev. P. A. Thomas, who lives west of Crofton. Mr. Thomas, his wife, a son and a daughter all have the disease. The cases are fully developed, but not considered dangerous. The son is improving. Dr. S. H. Williams has been detailed to vaccinate all exposed persons and maintain a strict quarantine.

Dr. Lackey has given emphatic instructions to leave nothing undone to stamp out the disease before it becomes epidemic.

Yesterday about noon Dr. Lackey was notified by the Hopkins county Health Officer that Marion Duke, postmaster at Red Hill, in this county, was developing a case of smallpox. Dr. Lackey left at once for Red Hill, which is 20 or more miles from this city, to investigate the report.

He will take any steps necessary to control the disease wherever it appears, leaving nothing undone that the law permits.

CLOSE CALL.

Little Boy Almost Loses an Eye From Airgun.

Logan Carmack Ellis, a little seven-year-old son of Mr. J. F. Ellis, had a narrow escape from death or serious injury from a toy airgun Monday. Another boy with whom he was playing accidentally shot him just above the right eye. The ball was imbedded in the flesh of the eyebrow, making a painful wound. An inch lower, it would have put out the eye and perhaps would have penetrated the brain.

Fred Ward, aged 15, was instantly killed at Greensboro, N. C., when a shotgun in the hands of his father, Richard Ward, was accidentally discharged while they were squirrel hunting.
