

## NEW CLERKS IN COURT HOUSE

THOSE WHO ARE TO TAKE OFFICE NEXT MONDAY.

Few Changes Are to be Made by Officials—John Bluth to Serve Under Dye.

The newly elected officers of Weber county will be formally inducted into office next Monday morning. Many of them have already filed their bonds and the others will do so before taking the oath of office.

With Sheriff Wilson will be Carl Allison, chief deputy, and Deputies John Murphy, P. J. Naylin, John Hutchens and S. H. Cave, the latter acting in the capacity of court bailiff.

Samuel G. Dye, the new county clerk, will formally assume his duties as an official early Monday morning and his office force will consist of John V. Bluth, chief clerk; Harry Hale, court clerk; Frank J. Henderson, general office clerk; Miss Ray Keck, cashier, and Mrs. Elda Guerin, Miss Edith Reid and Miss Janet Hingham, stenographers. Bookkeeper Zinn will remain with the new administration for a month or six weeks and then retire to engage in other pursuits.

County Treasurer Chambers will retain H. W. Naisbitt and A. G. Maw as deputies and Miss Allie Canady

will remain as a special clerk indefinitely.

County Recorder J. B. Wallace will retain C. O. DeWolf as chief deputy and Miss Annis B. Brown and Mrs. E. E. West as clerks.

County Assessor Edwin Dix will retain a clerical force composed of F. J. Chapin, Miss A. R. Maguire, W. W. Wilson and John W. Gibson.

Judge Howell will retain Miss Erb as chief court stenographer and Mr. Packer as deputy.


