**A FLORIDA CITY FOR THE VETERANS OF CIVIL WAR**

**New Town of Boca Ceiga for Both the Blue and the Gray Will be Dedicated This Week.**

(Tampa Morning News.)

Veteran City, a city where the noble old veterans of the north and south may spend their last days in peace and rest, is now an assured fact.

Capt. J. F. Chaise, of this city, is the originator of the idea and is doing all in his power to make the proposed city a success.

The captain, who is quartermaster of Kit Carson Post and Past Department Commander of the G. A. R., has been tirelessly and unselfishly working, ever since he came to the city several years ago, to eradicate all sectional feeling among the veterans of both sides who reside in the state.

He himself is one of the best known men in the Grand Army of the Republic and bears many scars as proof of the suffering he has himself endured on the battle field for the stars and stripes.

The captain was the originator of the idea of holding an annual campfire in the city for both the blue and the gray.

**His Good Work.**

It was through his work that the monuments in Greenwood cemetery were erected in memory of the dead of both the blue and the gray. The carrying out of both these ideas has gone far toward creating a friendlier feeling between northerners and southerners in this section.

He has been instrumental in bringing a large number of veterans to St. Petersburg. He was also the instigator of the Grand Army Hall here which is the only one in all Dixie owned by a Post.

Captain Chaise has also been one of the leaders in trying to get a bill passed by Congress to establish a Soldier's Home in Florida. He states that though the past Congress did not get it through it will in all probability pass the next one.

Although Capt. Chaise has been the leader in these many good works he says he has been supported by all the best comrades of the Grand Army and the Confederate Veterans.

**A Veteran City.**

The founding of a veteran city was his crowning idea, and at last all his hopes are to be realized.

A large tract of land has been secured near Disson City, on the shores of Boca Ceiga Bay, on the Gulf of Mexico, five miles from St. Petersburg.

The formal dedication of the city and a flag raising will be held at the site on April 5th.

Hon. E. R. Gunby, of Tampa, will deliver the oration of the day. Col. Gunby is said to be Florida's best orator. In addition short addresses will be made by well known veterans. Appropriate exercises will also be carried out.

The St. Petersburg and Gulf Railway will also contribute to the success of the occasion by running their cars to the site and by giving a regular old fashioned fish barbecue at noon in commemoration of the completion of their line to the waters of Boca Ceiga Bay.

**Its Object.**

The object in founding this city is to provide a home for the large number of veterans, who wish to spend the remainder of their lives beneath the sunny skies of Florida.

As land was necessarily very high in price about St. Petersburg, they got lower prices at the proposed location. Capt. Chaise succeeded in securing very liberal terms from the St. Petersburg and Gulf Railway Co., who are the owners of the land. The gentleman at the head of the concern deserve hearty praise for their liberality.

The company has plotted out 200 acres of land at their Boca Ceiga Bay terminal into lots from 65x175 feet in size upwards.

This is not a money making scheme for anyone.

The lots will be sold very cheap, and for streets and park will be presented free by the company to the city. In addition the company agrees to turn over ten per cent. of the money received from the sale of lots to the city for a fund for the improvement of streets and parks.

**To Deep Water.**

The company agrees to put in a public dock to deep water. Work has already begun on this dock.

Capt. Chaise is acting as special agent for the city. From present indications there will be over one thousand actual settlers in the city inside of a year.

According to law the city cannot be incorporated till settled by the requisite number for one year. Until the city is legally incorporated it will be governed by a board of governors.

The St. Petersburg and Gulf Railway company agrees to install a water works, a telephone system, and electric lights in the city as soon as a sufficient number of people have become inhabitants of the city.

This gives the city a start enjoyed by few cities at their birth.

The location is ideal. Freezes never come. The balmy breezes of the Gulf keep everything cool in summer. Fishing is good close by.

The captain is to be heartily commended for the work he has put forth in making this a success.

It will make in Florida a beautiful city where the grand old boys who wore the blue and those who wore the gray in the early sixties may spend their last days together in peace and security under the stars and stripes assisting each other to fight the great battle of life, standing shoulder to shoulder until victory is won and they receive the last command to assemble on that eternal camping ground where all is peace.

**H. T. PURSELL ON WHITE PRIMARY**

WELL KNOWN MILLVIEW CITIZEN WRITES ENDORSING IT AND GIVING REASONS THEREFOR.

Millview, Fla., March 30, 1905. Editor Pensacola Journal: Judging by the small number of candidates that have announced for nomination in the White Democratic Primary it looks as though some of the candidates for city offices, and part of the voters, are going to follow after the big rule or ruin politician and his lieutenants, who seem to be the whole push behind the Anti-Primary movement.

**REAL ESTATE MARKET FIRM**

REPORTS OF REAL ESTATE AGENTS SHOW A HEALTHY CONDITION OF AFFAIRS.

The local real estate market continues to hold up very well, and from indications, together with the statements of the various real estate dealers, the tone of the market is steady, with a good demand, which is likely to increase during the next few weeks.

Those of the leading real estate agents of the city upon the market, as expressed to The Journal yesterday, are as follows:

Thos. C. Watson & Co.: We have been quite busy during the past week and have sold not under six pieces of improved property on East Hill, as well as a large number of lots. One of the latter sales was to parties who intend improving, as it is one of the prettiest localities for a residence in the city. We have also made quite a number of loans upon property where the borrowers desired to invest further. Our loans during the week amounted to some \$30,000. The market shows a healthy condition, and we have a number of deals pending for property in Old City and East Hill. The demand for North Hill property is also good but there is none offering.

Pensacola Investment Company: We have sold during the week three pieces of property on East Intendencia street, which are very desirable. The purchasers were M. A. and J. E. Dubuisson. We also closed up a number of smaller transactions which had been pending. The tone of the market is very good, but there is some complaint that property is being held too high. Our party of thirty Germans sailed from New York to-day and will reach here about Tuesday. They will be settled in the Perdido section, where we have already located a large number. The inquiry for this property continues to be very good and increasing, and we expect next winter to make many sales and settle many families here.

Fisher Real Estate Agency: Business is holding up good with us, and we have closed quite a number of sales during the week. Some inquiry has been made for business property by out-of-town parties. Our sales have covered all sections of the city, and among them is the site for the large cotton warehouse which is to be erected by local parties. In fact the prospects for Pensacola were never better. The market has a steady tone.

L. S. Brown & Co.: The inquiry from parties residing in other cities and states, as received by us, continues to grow and the demand for Pensacola real estate is therefore good. We have a number of deals under way, which will probably be consummated at an early date. The past week was a very good one, and we made a number of sales, especially in lots in all sections of the city.
