in compiling the abstracts of Bradford
county, I find that there are many deeds
missing that are necessary to complete
the chain of title to much of the land,
and especially is this true of the lots in
Starke. As the records of the county
have been destroyed twice, I take it for
granted that many persons think their
deeds are now on record, whereas all
deeds filed prior to 1876 that have not
since been re-filed do not appear. I
think some notice ought to be made of
this so that persons may take steps to
learn what deeds are necessary to be
recorded in order to perfect their land
