CALL FOR A WHITE DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY ELECTION.

The State Democratic Executive Committee having fixed the date for a primary election on January 10, 1911, the Democratic Executive Committee of Bradford county hereby issues its formal call for a primary election to be held on

TUESDAY, JANUARY 10, 1911. In such election precinct in Bradford county, to allow the democratic voters to express their choice for a United States Senator to be elected by the Legislature at its next regular session.

A second primary shall be held on Tuesday, January 11, 1911, in the event no candidate is chosen by majority vote at the first election. The primary election shall be held from 8 o'clock a. m. until sundown.

The officers of the election shall be three inspectors, one of whom shall act as Clerk. Should either person so appointed fail to appear at the polls to perform his duties for fifteen minutes after the time to open, then the inspector or inspectors present shall fill the vacancy from the bystanders; Provided, no candidates shall be an inspector.

All white democratic electors qualified to vote at the general election November 8, 1910, shall be allowed to vote in these primaries.

The inspectors shall keep a poll list of all persons voting and return the same, with the ballots cast, to the Secretary of the committee, on or before 10 o'clock a. m. on Thursday, January 12, 1911. At the close of the polls they shall publicly count the ballots cast and announce the result, and shall make duplicate certificates of the result, one of which shall be retained by the Clerk and the other delivered to the member of the Executive Committee, who shall deliver the same to the Secretary of the Committee.

The returns of said election shall be canvassed by this committee on Thursday, January 12th, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m., at the court house in Starke.


