TO KEEP CHICAGO CLEAN.

Chicago Takes a Step Forward For Municipal Cleanliness. Chicago's new ordinance for the enforcement of municipal cleanliness and the regulation of the collection and removal of garbage takes the place of all existing ordinances on these matters and is sweeping in its effect.

The ordinance begins by prohibiting any person from throwing into the streets, alleys, river, canal or other public place any ashes, garbage, refuse or miscellaneous waste.
