Now that the great undertaking has been let by contract, its early completion may be looked forward to as coming within a very short period, much earlier than if left to the red tape of government supervision. The earlier the canal is completed the more rapidly will the north and south lines be completed. One of the largest corporations seeking another gulf outlet is the Rock Island system. This system has already secured terminals at Bolivar Point. It is now apparently their purpose to build a line from some point to the north, perhaps Paris, through this section to the gulf. As soon as this iron interest is opened up, this will make the building of the road through here the more certain. These are facts. It is evident matters have progressed further than some think.

The question confronting Senator Bailey and the Democratic party, not only state, but national, is to what extent has his usefulness as a leader been impaired? Will the Democratic Senators force him to go with the trust, or will they take him back, forgetting what has happened? Should they do this will it carry conviction to the rank and file of the party? The press outside the state are criticizing very severely the fact that an election of the Senator was had pending an investigation. No one questions but what the whole affair has the appearance of being rushed—unnecessarily rushed. Had the investigation taken place before the election, then perhaps no one would have questioned the verdict but now, there may be some question. The fact remains that the Senator's usefulness has been badly impaired—perhaps beyond his ability to restore.

Mass Meeting.
Having learned through the press and other sources, that the Santa Fe railroad proposes to build a new line of road from Longview, Texas, to the Gulf of Mexico, via Beaumont to Bolivar, provided they will be permitted by the legislature to do this by connecting three short lines of railroad now owned by their south of Longview, and in order to ascertain the wishes of our citizens of this section of our State on this subject a mass meeting of the citizens of Marion county and Jefferson was held at the court house in the city of Jefferson on Monday, 28th inst., and by unanimous vote the following action was taken:
Resolved, That we recognize the great need of increased railroad facilities in our section of Texas, and such a proposed line of road as above to the Gulf would be of great value to the City of Jefferson and Marion county and other counties, therefore be it
Resolved, By the citizens of Marion county in mass meeting assembled, that we urgently request our senator, Hon. J. M. Terrell, and our representative, Hon. L. P. Wilson, to use their utmost endeavors to have such authority granted by law to the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe railroad, as will enable said company to construct said new line of railroad to the gulf, and we also request our Governor, Hon. T. M. Campbell, and our railroad commission to do all they can to aid us and our fellow citizens of Northeast, East and Southeast Texas, in building up our section of country, and in developing our iron, hardwood and other resources, and opening up splendid fruit belt by the construction of this proposed new line of railroad, and be it further
Resolved, That we send a copy of this resolution to Gov. T. M. Campbell, and to Hon. Allison Mayfield, chairman of the railroad commission, and to Senator J. M. Terrell and to Representative L. P. Wilson.

Stockholders' Meeting.
The stockholders of the Farmers' Union met at the court house at Jefferson, Texas, January 26, 1907, President Tait in the chair, Davis Biggs secretary pro tem. The chairman stated that the warehouse had been accepted and that the board of directors had made a contract with the public weigher whereby he is to use all the warehouse property, taking care of the same, and to receive for his services 10 cents a bale for the cotton he handles, and that the storage on cotton on the platform is to be 15c per bale, and in the warehouse 25 cents per bale per month. The trustees have arranged to insure the warehouse for \$1,500. These arrangements are to hold good until the first of September next when arrangements will be made the fall season.
After Monday, the 28th inst., stock will be signed up ready for delivery to all who have paid up their notes.
On motion F. J. Rogers was elected treasurer.
The following resolution was passed: As it has been understood and adopted as part of our by-laws that each stockholder is only entitled to one vote regardless of the number of shares he may hold, that we reiterate this principle and incorporate it in our charter.
A motion prevailed to recommend to the trustees that the warehouse be insured for \$2,000.
The meeting adjourned to the regular meeting in May unless sooner convened by the president, H. D. Hall, President, Davis Biggs, Sec'y Pro Tem.
