ANOTHER WAR CLOUD.

Disquieting conditions which may give rise to serious trouble between Japan and China, if not between Russia and China also, are reported by the Tokio Kokumine, according to advices received at Victoria, B. C. yesterday. It is said that the intimacy between Russians and Japanese in Manchuria is having a serious effect upon the Chinese, and that anti-Japanese and anti-Russian sentiment is increasing. When the maneuvers of the Japanese troops in Manchuria were being arranged in November Chinese officials sent troops to the scene, and only through tact on the part of the Japanese was this force withdrawn. Since then the Chinese troops and police along the Antung-Mukden Railway have instigated Chinese coolies to intimidate Korean laborers, with the result that for three days 1,000 Chinese and Koreans battled.
