CRIPPLES BEATEN BY CAIRO'S TEAM

Eddie Taylor Hero of Fans on This Occasion.

Result of Today's Game Determines Paducah's Right to Head of Column Position.

Eddie Taylor, hero. The result of yesterday's game, the first of the long looked for Cairo-Paducah series, can be summed up in the above terse statement. The Indians were defeated, and it was through no work of the "umps," we are glad to say. We have excuses to make, for excuses are always in order, but the only thing Paducah fans are joyous about is the fact that the Indians were not shut out, and Eddie Taylor is the little fellow who hit the home run that saved the day—that is, part of the day.

A large crowd of fans was out to see the game, and a good game was expected. A good game was played too, except in one or two instances when the Indians went to pieces because of the broken up condition of the infield.

The Reason.

Eddie Gilligan was seized by a hard shaking chill the night before and that morning woke up a sick man. He was unable to leave his bed, which necessitated a change-up in the Indians' lineup.

Haas was sent to second and "Chief" Lloyd trampled over first sack. The "Chief" did well considering everything, but the line was faltering and several slips were costly. To the fact that Gilligan was out of the game can be attributed the defeat of the Indians yesterday. It was a hard fought battle. The Mud Wallowers from down the bend won, and they won it fairly; so here's to the one time "Champs."

The Calamity.

It looked like goose eggs for the Indians from the first. The visitors started out by pushing the Indians hard. In the second inning two tallies were marked and another in the eighth inning. The Indians scored two in the ninth through the phenomenal stick work of Taylor.

In the second inning Roland tied out to M. Miller. Dithridge waited successfully for four bad ones, and was caught between first and second by a foxy trick of Ames. Lloyd

threw too high and the ball went over Perry's head, "Dith" making safe. Conklin got a reward for patience and at this juncture Jimmie Connors, the first sacker the Indians gave to Cairo to keep the town from quitting the league, lined out a beautiful single to right center, Dithridge scoring. Connors stole second and Bissell hit to Perry. Conklin scored on the throw to first. Wagner retired the side with a clipper to Perry.

In the eighth inning the second tally was brought about in this way. Wagner lined to center and Taylor dropped the ball. Long retired himself with a grounder to Perry as also did Larson. Roland singled a long drive to left. It went past Miller and Wagner scored, but Roland only made first base. Dithridge retired the side by a grounder.

The Indians tallied brought genuine cheers for Eddie Taylor the hero. Wetzel worked Wagner for a jolt in the slats and Miller ran the bases for him. Lloyd grounded out but Miller made second on the play. Eddie Taylor met a waist ball and it went to center field like a streak of lightning. Long never touched it until it hit the fence and bounded back. By this time Taylor was at third and with a mighty effort made the plate. He beat the throw by several feet, scoring Miller and making a clean home run. Perry fanned and the side was retired by Chonault's fly out to right field.

ANCHORED COWS

CAUSE LAWYERS TO DELVE INTO LAW ON SUBJECT.

Does Wooden Block Constitute Confinement to Meet Spirit of Stock Ordinance.

The question of "anchored" cows probably will come before the court for an interpretation shortly. During the past week or two cow owners have been using a wooden block for an anchor for their cows. The cow is tied to a long rope and the block tied to the other end. It is an arrangement similar to that of a horse attached to a hitching weight, only the wooden block is larger and harder to pull around.

Cows have been seen in the depot and also in other sections of town tied, and attorneys have begun to look into the matter. The ordinance reads that cows must be kept within the confines of a fence or else be attended by a herder.
