

HARGIS' ALARMED BY COURT ORDER TO STOP DELAY

Sheriffs Scour Neighboring County for 300 Veniremen to Serve on Jury.

LEXINGTON, Ky., May 8.—The trial of Judge James Hargis, the alleged arch conspirator in all the Breckitt county assassination plots which resulted in the killing of Dr. E. D. Cox, James Cockrill, and James Marcum, has been called here for the murder of Cockrill.

Judge Watts Parker has ruled that the trial must proceed now. Judge Hargis was greatly surprised at the turn affairs have taken, and is frantically endeavoring to get witnesses together. Three sheriffs have gone to Scott county to summon a special venire of 300 men from which to select the jury. It is believed to be impossible to secure one in this county, as "Bill" Britton has just been tried here for this offense.

Scott county is strongly Democratic. Judge Hargis is a member of the State Democratic committee. Friends charge that Hargis is being persecuted because he is a Democrat. Caleb Powers, a Republican, has been convicted three times for alleged complicity in the assassination of Senator William J. Goebel, the Democratic aspirant for governor in 1900.
