# VINCENT FOUND NOT GUILTY OF SELLING LIQUOR

Will Be Held on Charge to Be Made—Witness Talks Out in Sleep in Court Room.

Paul Vincent, formerly of Juneau but later of Tenakee, who has been on trial in the district court for the past three days charged with selling liquor to Indians, will be brought before Commissioner Marshall on a charge of selling whiskey without a license.

Vincent was found "not guilty" of the charge of selling whiskey to Indians by a jury late yesterday afternoon but he was ordered detained on the request of the District Attorney pending the outcome of the trial of the other charge. If sufficient evidence is produced Vincent will be bound over to the next Grand Jury.

It is alleged that Vincent has been receiving quantities of whiskey, beer and gin, at Tenakee, and that he has been disposing of it to people living there and to loggers and fishermen working in that vicinity.

One of the amusing incidents of the Vincent trial occurred yesterday when H. H. Rice, the one witness for the defense, except the defendant himself, fell asleep in the court room and talked.

Rice has a habit of talking in his sleep and yesterday, overcome by the warm air in the court room, dozed off. Just as the court was instructing the jury, Rice commenced to mumble to himself. Judge Jennings stopped reading, but before Librarian J. A. Hurley could reach Rice and waken him, Rice said: "Oh, they'll get him yet, it is only a matter of time."

Several of the spectators tittered and the officials of the court were hardly able to keep the broad smiles from creeping over their faces. Rice was awakened and left the court room considerably disturbed.
