NEUTRAL MUST STEP INTO THE EUROPEAN WAR

Massachusetts Banker Is Emphatic on Three Points Relative to Present War.

BOSTON, Jan. 30.—"When an invincible force meets an invulnerable foe, it is time for the strongest neutral power to step in and bring about peace," said Harvard Professor Albert Bushnell Hart at the annual banquet of the Massachusetts Bankers' Association. He emphasized three points, namely:

That Germany cannot be brought to her knees; that there can be no advantage in continuation of the war, and that the United States should intervene to bring about peace lest the whole world be prostrated. He declared that Germany's desire for a large section of Asia Minor as a colony is one of the great obstacles to peace, but predicted that after the war Constantinople will be either in Russian or German hands. He said Germany is capable of putting 5,000,000 more men in the field if necessary.

FIRST TIME IN YEARS AMERICA GETS BIG EDGE

Cops the Trade From Argentines Over That Formerly Held by the British.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—United States exporters in 1916 outdid for the first time British houses in competition for Argentina's foreign trade. Official Argentine estimates made public by the Department of Commerce show that during the first nine months of the year Argentine purchasers in this country ran just \$100,000 ahead of purchases in Great Britain. Both were close to \$45,000,000.

In former years Great Britain was ahead by a wide margin, and that country still leads all other purchasers of Argentine goods.

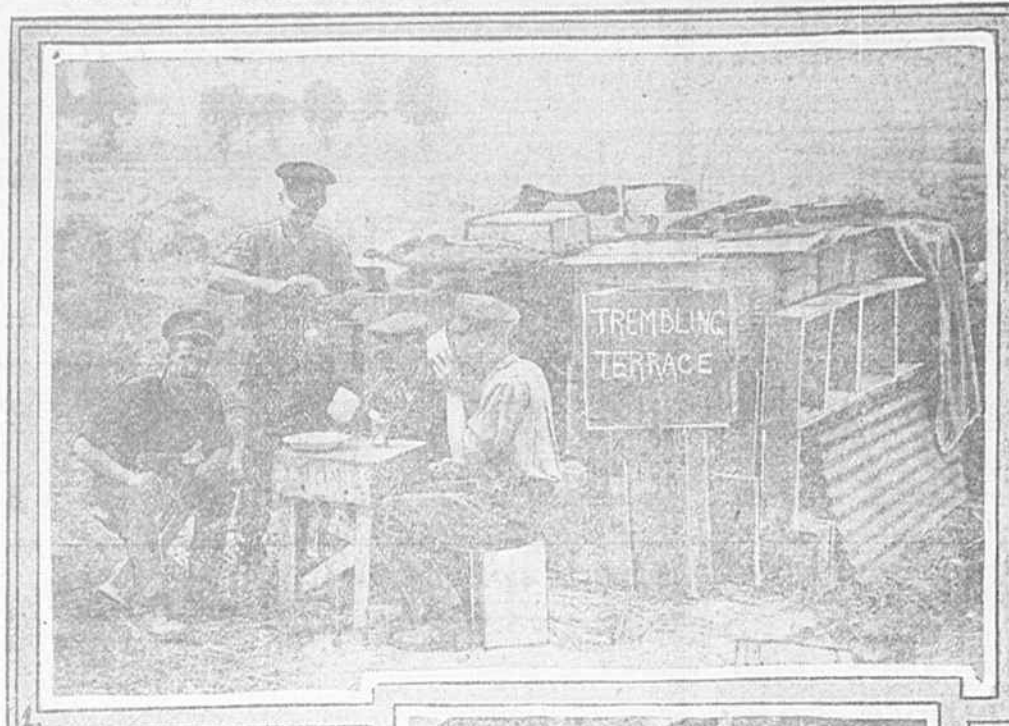

SUITOR ACCUSED OF JEWEL THEFT TURNS MURDERER

Smooth Man With Women Brought to Time and Finally Decides to End It All.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 30.—A man known to the police as Charles Dowling shot and wounded Mrs. H. Jorold so seriously physicians say she will die and then committed suicide. Mrs. Jorold is 24 years old. Dowling, the police say, was sought in several cities as a man who fell in love with pretty girls and women whose pictures appeared in the papers and after an acquaintance would disappear with money or jewelry. Mrs. Jorold reported to the police yesterday she suspected Dowling of having a valuable diamond ring belonging to her. Her picture appeared in a St. Louis newspaper recently. Dowling's first words on meeting her, she said, were:

"I clipped your picture out of the paper. You looked so good to me." A close friendship followed. Dowling told Mrs. Jorold he was superintendent of an East St. Louis mill. When Dowling failed to keep an engagement she telephoned:

"Dowling is not superintendent here," he swoops out, "she was in formed."

It was then she missed her diamond and reported to the police. The story appeared in the St. Louis papers and the shooting followed.

III. Speeches of St. Peter and St. Paul—eight of former, ten of latter. (1) Earliest life and warfare of Church wonderfully reflected. (2) Great central fact of Church's message—Jesus is the Christ. (3) Catholicity or wholeness of Church.

GERMANS CONFIDENT THAT THEIR COUNTRY CANNOT BE INVADED

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Germans are still confident their country cannot be invaded and are a unit in the belief that, if nothing is accomplished by peace overtures, the strength of their military forces will be sufficient to bring the war to a satisfactory conclusion, according to Carl Lincoln Schurz, who has just returned from Germany. In Berlin and Hamburg he found no real food shortage and hotels were crowded. The prices were slightly higher. People went about their business daily, and the only visible sign of war was the number of soldiers at the railway stations and on the cars.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 30.—Subscriptions to a new Australian war bond which closes February 8 have reached a total of \$50,000,000 so far, according to a cablegram to the Australian trade commission. The new bonds bear 4 1/2 per cent interest.

BACK TO ASYLUM MUST GO WOMAN WHO SUED TEDDY

Ida Van Clausen Dona Ordered Back to the House Where Insane People Dwell.

NYACK, N. Y., Jan. 30.—Mrs. Ida van Clausen Dona, who has figured frequently in the newspapers because of alleged attempts to annoy Theodore Roosevelt and other noted men, was today directed by Supreme Court Justice Tompkins to be taken into custody by the superintendent of the Middletown state hospital. She was once committed to the Bloomingdale asylum but was released on a supreme court order after being placed under observation of physicians, who declared her sane.

Subsequent to leaving Bloomingdale, Mrs. Dona was committed to the Middletown institution. She was permitted to go on parole in the custody of a relative. While on parole she married Francis A. Dona after fleeing from the home of the relative and was then ordered re-committed to Middletown. On her behalf today a motion was made to have the order of recommitment vacated and it was denied by Justice Tompkins. Mrs. Dona once tried to sue Col. Roosevelt on the ground that while President he had prevented her from being presented to the Swedish court.

NITRATE PLANT SITE WILL BE INVESTIGATED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—President Wilson has designated Secretaries Baker, Lane and Houston to investigate and report on the selection of a site for the proposed government nitrate plant for which \$20,000,000 was authorized at the last session of Congress. Selection of the site was left by Congress with the President.
