TORPEDO WITH EARS AND A BRAIN SAID TO BE AN INVENTION

PITTSBURGH, Pa., March 2.—A torpedo with "ears and a brain," capable of traveling 40 knots and adjusting itself to meet all changes of course of an enemy vessel, was demonstrated here the other night before the Pittsburgh Academy of Science by Montraville M. Wood, Chicago scientist. This torpedo is in the possession of the United States government. He claims it can "hear" a vessel approaching a mile and a half away and would then shed its anchor and attack.

WAR SPECULATORS WILL GET GRIEF IF WAR DECLARED

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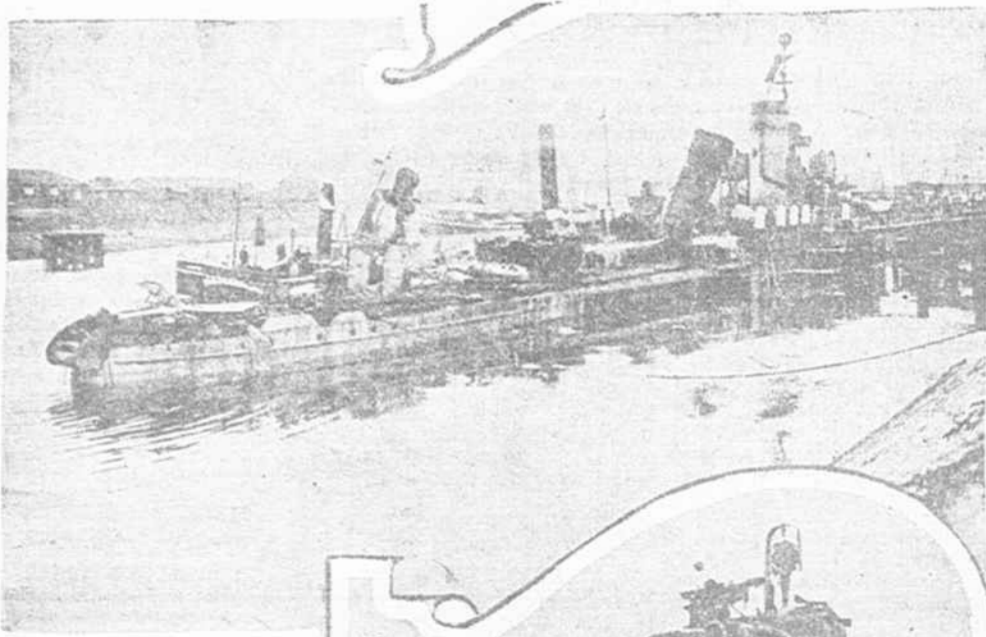
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GERMAN DESTROYER V-69 BATTERED UP OFF HOLLAND COAST



The German torpedo boat destroyer "V-39" was engaged in battle one hundred miles from Zebrugge on January 23 with a British destroyer and put out of commission. The upper picture shows the V-69 in Ymuiden Harbor, Holland, where she managed to seek shelter and protection. Her deck guns and funnels were almost entirely swept away, and her engines in working order, the crumpled mass managed to get to the Holland coast. The lower picture shows the forecastle, which was less damaged than any other part of the vessel, but the entire crew at this gun were slain outright while serving the piece.
