DOUGLAS, Nov. 6.—Complete returns from Treadwell and Douglas show that a large vote was cast in both places, and that the non-partisan ticket leads by substantial majorities. Following is the vote in detail:

The big election is over, and a larger vote was polled on the island than had been expected. There were 108 votes cast at Treadwell with the following results: for senator—H. T. Tripp 67; J. M. Tanner 70; E. Valentine 45; H. B. LeFevre 30; G. F. Bland 4; Carl A. Swanson 5; House—John Reck 47; L. P. Dawes 34; Martin Olson 37; A. W. Thomas 35; C. E. Ingersoll 60; A. G. Shoup 52; William Stubbins 71; N. J. Svindseth 60; Peter Tweit 5; John Noland 5; E. A. Heath 5; and Geo. W. Stukeby 4.

Douglas with 202 votes went as follows: for senator—H. T. Tripp 157; J. H. Tanner 148; E. Valentine 110; H. B. LeFevre 96; G. V. Bland 40; C. A. Swanson 41; House—C. E. Ingersoll 134; A. G. Shoups 116; William Stubbins 183; W. J. Svindseth 132; John Reck 100; L. P. Dawes 83; Martin Olson 112; A. W. Thomas 86; Peter Tweit 40; John Noland 37; E. A. Heath 38; and G. W. Stukeby 45.

The reports received are as follows: Admiralty Trading Company, at Gambier Bay, 33822 cases; Hoonah Packing Company, at Hoonah, 46,247 cases; Pacific American Fisheries, at Excursion Inlet, 100,864 cases; Sanborn & Cram Company, at Burnett Inlet, 22,697 cases; Irving Packing Company, at Karheeny, 27,715 cases.

All of the returns were accompanied with checks for full amounts of the tax levy at four cents per case.


